In math, we have been working really hard on our numbers one through ten. We have been counting, writing, and building our numbers in many different ways. Counting while moving has been one of our favorite activities. Finding numbers and shapes throughout the school and house has been one of the fun ways to make connections.

Kindergarten has blasted off with iPads. Students are using them daily within the classroom and are enjoying all the ways to interact with one another using technology. They have been a great way for students to practice recording their voices, taking pictures of their work and playing different games that reinforce what we've been learning. IPads have not only reduced the number of papers traveling around the classrooms, but also engaged our students in learning and allowed for them to move at their individual pace for learning.

First Grade News

Do you know how many bones or muscles we have in our bodies? Well, first grade does! We've been exploring and discovering new information about how our bodies work and grow. All the amazing networks of body systems (skeletal, muscular, digestive, circulatory, and nervous) are comprised of organs that work together to perform a variety of vitally important jobs. Students have also explored germs that cause diseases and how to stop the spread, keys to good health and the importance of a well-balanced diet to help us grow and stay healthy. First grade is happy to tell you that we have about 206 bones and 650 muscles working together in our bodies!





Second Grade News Mrs. Livingston, Mrs. Clark, Miss Perrin and Miss Gerard

We've had a busy start to second grade!

In reading, students have heard and learned about Fairy Tales and Tall Tales, Ancient Greek Civilizations, and Greek Myths. They have also read stories about a sneaky cat bandit, along with reading trickster tales and fables. Second graders have been busy learning many new phonics sounds and spellings, including oi, oy, ou, ow, oo, ar, er, or, and long and short vowels. They have been working on developing the skill of going back into the text to find their evidence for the answer. Lastly, they have been using the organizer somebody, wanted, but, so, then to help them retell a fiction story.

In math, students are working hard on developing their understanding of place value within 1000. They are learning to count within 1000 using a variety of strategies to skip count by 10s and 100s from any number.

Students are learning that each digit in a 3-digit number represents the amount of hundreds, tens, and ones. They are learning how to compare 3-digit numbers represented in all forms (number form, word form, expanded form, and unit form). Students are continually working on mastering their math facts with sums and differences within 20. Please work on math facts within 20 at home.

Students have been learning about how to write complete sentences, making sure to use capitals and punctuation. Second graders have been working on varying their sentences using different types of punctuation. They have also learned about using quotation marks in their writing.

PE Corner Mrs. Auman

What a great start to the year! Mrs. Auman's PE classes started out with a "Building a Foundation" unit outside. Grades PK-2 worked on locomotor skills and movements. Grades 3-5 started with fun group games of Rock, Paper, Scissors and 11's. Our soccer unit was next. Students worked hard on their dribbling skills in a Hoops game. Soccer bowling and Soccer golf focused on passing skills. We concluded the unit with a version of Foosball Soccer. The game focused on positions and passing. Fun was had by all!





Earth Science News Ms. Renyck

I am thrilled to be back in the classroom with your children—and what a wonderful group of young people taking Earth Science this year! I couldn't be prouder of how the students are handling the COVID-19 safety protocols in my classroom for the benefit of all.

We are currently engaged in the Earth's Interior & Plate Tectonics unit of the NYS Science Learning Standards. This includes the study of minerals, rocks, volcanism, plate tectonics, earthquakes, the processes that create them, and locating places on Earth.

Please note that I teach the same lesson on Monday-Tuesday and Thursday-Friday. I live Zoom my lessons on Tuesday and Friday. Guidelines for Selection of National Honor Society Members

Membership in the National Honor Society is one of the highest honors awarded to a high school student. As part of the by-laws of the National Honor Society Constitution, each school district is required to publish its selection procedures annually. Bolivar-Richburg's selection procedures are as follows:

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURES

At the midpoint of the school year (i.e. after the 2nd marking period), each high school teacher receives a list of juniors and seniors who have met the scholastic eligibility requirement of having a 91% or higher average. This score reflects the student's cumulative high school average through the midpoint of the current school year. The teachers will evaluate students on the three other criteria necessary for selection: leadership, service and character. Teachers will only evaluate students with whom they have had direct contact.

During this process, each scholastically eligible student receives and completes a **Student Activity Information Sheet.** On it, students list their activities and extracurricular information for the Faculty Council to review. In addition, the Faculty Council asks that each candidate submit a written response to a provided writing prompt. The Faculty Council is a committee consisting of five high school teachers and is appointed annually. The principal and NHS advisor are **non-voting members** of the council. This body reviews each student's activity form, written statement, as well as faculty recommendations. Candidates receiving a majority vote (i.e. at least three votes) of the Faculty Council are inducted into our NHS chapter.

When students receive their Student Activity Information Sheet, it is imperative that students do NOT leave any section blank. In order to be inducted into the National Honor Society, students must meet all criteria necessary for selection – scholarship, leadership, service and character. It is impossible to tell if a student meets the criteria if a section is left blank.

All eligible candidates in the current Junior and Senior classes will receive information from Mr. Baldwin after the 2nd marking period. If you have any questions about the National Honor Society please contact Mr. Baldwin, the NHS advisor at: ebaldwin@bolivarrichburg.org.

College Reps, Fairs and Visits

Unfortunately, this year we were not able to hold our usual ACCA College Fair at Houghton College. However, some colleges are still allowing students to visit campuses for tours and are still coming to BRCS to see students in person. However, many are utilizing virtual campus tours and virtual college rep meetings.

The dates and Zoom codes for college reps are currently being sent to students in our Guidance Teams that we have created entitled: "Guidance Info-Juniors Class of 2022" and "Guidance Info-Senior Class of 2021".

Mrs. Crandall-Bean is glad to help students with college exploration applications and setting up in-person and virtual visits.

Seniors Make Future Plans

I have met with all seniors individually to review transcripts and make corrections if needed, determine what specific courses and regents exams are still needed to be passed for graduation, discuss post-high school plans and map out the tasks they need to complete for their career plans. Each student was given an individualized folder of tasks to complete for their specific post-secondary career, military or college plan. Those students who are interested in college may have been given handouts about selecting and applying to colleges. It is highly recommended that seniors complete their college application(s) by the end of Thanksgiving recess. However, some programs require students to apply earlier to ensure that their program of choice is not filled to capacity. Watch all application deadlines! Students are welcome to have their applications proofread in the Guidance Office prior to submitting them. Also, since most students are now applying on-line, it is vitally important that they let me or my secretary know each time they apply so that we mail or upload the student's official transcript. Colleges require an official transcript of high school grades and will not process a student's college application until they have received one.

Any parent who wishes more information about the college selection process or financial aid can call Mrs. Crandall-Bean at school at 928-2985 or send an email to ccbean@bolivarrichburg.org. The "Senior Fall To- Do List", "Basics of Financial Aid" and "Scholarship Searches" video presentations can be found electronically on the high school guidance website and will be pushed out to students in grades 11 & 12 in Microsoft Teams. These documents may be helpful to parents of seniors to make sure that important fall tasks are being completed in a timely manner. We are trying to not take in person class time from teachers for Guidance lessons so we are using Wednesdays and virtual video lessons as much as we can.

College Entrance Testing: PSAT, ACT and SAT Testing

Interested sophomores and juniors took the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) on Wednesday, October 14 with Mrs. Bean. The PSAT is a "practice/warm-up" for the SAT and enters juniors into the National Merit Scholarship Competition. PSAT results should be available in December. At that time, I will review the test with students and they will receive a printout of their results to take home.

We will be offering a PreACT practice exam for sophomores and juniors this winter. The date has not yet been determined.

College-bound juniors are encouraged to consider taking the SAT or the ACT in the spring. Many counselors feel the ACT is a fairer exam for students and colleges accept ACT scores equal to SAT scores. Registration documents for both tests are available in the Guidance Office and on the Guidance website to assist students with the on-line registration process. Registering on-line is relatively simple, convenient and will allow students to receive their test scores quickly.

Test optional - What does that mean?

Due to COVID's indoor large group gathering restrictions, many SAT and ACT exams were cancelled earlier this year. Therefore, many colleges have gone "test-optional" meaning no SAT or ACT is required for college applications to their institutions. Many colleges may remain test optional in the future after COVID restrictions are lightened. However, to be safe it does not hurt to take at least one SAT or ACT exam in case it is needed in the future for college acceptance and scholarship contests.

Websites for College and Career Exploration

Need help exploring colleges, find out more about the financial aid process, look into finding a career, or about touring a college virtually on-line? Here are a few fantastic websites that will surely help both students and parents:

Students in grades 10-12 also have their own accounts on-line, which they created on the Career Cruising website in order to save their college and career research documents.

How to Access the High School Guidance Web Page

Parents and students can access a large amount of information on the Guidance webpages. Start at the BRCS home page (www.brcs.wnyric.org), click on the pulldown menu at the top of the page titled "Departments," and then click on "Guidance." To the left of the screen you will see links to the middle school as well as the high school guidance webpages. Topics on the high school guidance site include: scholarships, financial aid, summer school, regents examination schedules, recommended websites, graduation requirements, course descriptions, summer camps, info just for seniors, SAT, ACT and drivers' education information.

SCHEDULES FOR GRADE 6-12 STUDENTS HAVE BEEN FINALIZED. THE DROP PERIOD IS NOW OVER AND STUDENTS WILL REMAIN IN THEIR CURRENT COURSES FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE YEAR. The only drops that may be allowed will now require a parent/student/teacher discussion and must be approved by the building principal and teachers.

College Financial Aid Information

In the past, the FAFSA application portal (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) has opened on January 1. This portal is how students qualify for free federal grant money and for federal student loans at low interest rates. The FAFSA portal now opens earlier on October 1 each year. This allows families a greater amount of time to be wise consumers regarding college costs and reviewing financial aid award letters before making a college commitment by the May 1 national commitment date.

Financial aid is very detail-oriented so if you have questions, do not hesitate to call the Guidance Office or any college financial aid office for assistance.

Two of the best resources for parents to find more information on this process are at the Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC) website: www.hesc.org and at www.hesc.org and at www.higher-www.finaid.org. These two sites are loaded with information for parents and are two of the very best and easiest to navigate. Further, these sites are not just for parents of seniors but also for parents of any students who are considering college.

Lastly, parents (or students) should not feel the need to pay for help with financial aid forms or for scholarship searches. Often times the services that advertise to help you with these are frauds or, at the very least, a rip-off. They often promise students thousands of dollars in financial aid. The rule of thumb, "If you have to pay, stay away!" We have provided the best free resources on our scholarship webpage for you to utilize. If you have very complicated finances, you may want your personal financial planner to assist with the financial aid process. But those are not typical instances for most people.

Also, do not forget to complete the NYS TAP (Tuition Assistance Program) Grant financial aid application at https://www.hesc.ny.gov/pay-for-college/apply-forfinancial-aid/apply-for-aid-start-here.html. Then click on the pulldown menu at the top of the page titled "Departments" and click on "Guidance." TAP money is available for eligible New York State residents who plan to attend college within New York State.

The New York State Excelsior Grant is on hold at this time due to a lack of funding for it at the state government level.



COVID Update

<u>Daily Checks</u> – All faculty and staff members must complete a daily COVID questionnaire and temperature check.

<u>Thermo-Imaging</u> – In late September, we added an additional layer of coverage to our COVID screening. We installed two portable thermoimaging cameras in each building that are capable of quickly scanning students/staff/visitors to check for temperatures over 100 degrees. We have also been doing random touchless temperature checks on a limited number of students each morning as a back-up to the thermoimaging.

<u>Daily Cleaning</u> – The District has hired additional custodians/cleaners in each building that provide extra support for thorough cleaning and disinfecting of all classrooms and daily common areas throughout the school buildings. This cleaning occurs throughout the school day and in the evenings after the students and faculty have left for the day. After all surfaces have been cleaned and wiped down, as a final precaution, the rooms are fogged with a disinfectant spray.

<u>Masks/Social Distancing</u> – Mask wearing occurs at all times in each building except while eating or if socially distanced. Teachers will be allowed to designate mask breaks throughout the day provided students maintain social distancing.

When can a student/staff member be released from quarantine? — When a student or staff member is on quarantine, they can only be released by the Allegany County Health Department. When they return to the building, they must check-in with the school nurse for final approval before they can return to class/work.

Parents - Beware of Scholarship and Financial Aid "SCAMS"

In years past, several students and parents have called about information they have received in the mail or phone calls they have received regarding college scholarships and financial aid. Usually the sales pitch starts something like this, "Do you know that over two million dollars in college scholarships went unclaimed last year? We can guarantee you a scholarship for college!" Often times the e-mails or envelope and the letters look like they have been sent from an official agency with words like "national," "exclusive" and "education" in their title. I say, buyer beware!

Quite often the scholarships and the financial aid assistance these companies offer as part of their service are routinely available for **free** right here at school or on many websites. Furthermore, no one can promise you a scholarship because a legitimate scholarship is <u>always</u> competitive. Lastly, most financial aid that students receive for college will be generated from the FAFSA form or directly from the student's college.

My advice to parents is to exercise caution and call me before signing on to one of these "financial aid" businesses. A call or search online to the Better Business Bureau (703-276-0100) or the Attorney General (through the Consumer Protection Board – 800-697-1220) is another way to verify a company's reputation. More than likely, high schools and colleges can do just as much for you as one of these companies – the only difference is that we don't charge a thing. We in the Guidance Office can provide you with excellent resources for doing high quality scholarship searches and have an abundance of information linked on the Guidance website under the scholarship page.

ASVAB CEP Career Exploration Program for Juniors and Seniors

On Wednesday, December 2, interested juniors and seniors can take the ASVAB exam at 11:45 a.m. in the lecture hall, which will allow students to learn more about their academic strengths and weaknesses and how their aptitudes can affect their future career paths. The ASVAB can also be used as an entrance exam for enlisting in the military. Then on Wednesday, December 9, all interested students will then participate in a career exploration lesson virtually by Zoom with Dr. Faith Durden, who oversees the ASVAB program for all of Western New York and Pennsylvania. She will interpret those results for students. Students will also complete the FYI (Find Your Interests) career interest inventory. This is an excellent career exploration program, which is free to schools. We give the ASVAB on students' school laptops, which allows students to proceed with testing at their own pace and be dismissed as soon as they are done testing.

STUDENTS CAN SIGN UP FOR ASVAB ELECTRONICALLY OR IN PERSON IN THE GUIDANCE OFFICE BY NOVEMBER 24.

Parents of juniors, please be aware that the ASVAB test results will be released at the end of the school year to military recruiters because the ASVAB is the entrance exam used by military branches. If you do NOT want your child's scores released to the military, please also notify us in the Guidance Office by November 24. However, please realize that the primary purpose of this program is for juniors to explore future career paths. This program's intention is not to lead students in any way shape or form necessarily toward a military career. These ASVAB scores, however, are active scores for students wishing to enlist in the future. If you have questions regarding this program, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs. Bean at 928-2985.

Students who were slated to take January Regents exams needed to graduate can receive a regents exam exemption **IF** they pass the corresponding course related to the Regents exam by the end of January 2021, or if they are currently in a remedial Regents test prep class preparing to take a Regents.

There is also a PowerSchool phone app that parents and students can use. The free app can be obtained through the App Store or the Google Play store. The BRCS school code is CRKT. Many students and parents use the portal phone app to stay on top of their academic information, as it is a wonderful communication tool!
