

The New York State Teacher of the Year Award Goes to a Bolivar-Richburg Instructor!

In this newsletter, I would like to highlight wonderful news we received a couple of months ago. Mrs. Patricia Eshelman has been honored with the Teacher of the Year Award for New York State in Agricultural Science.

This is the first time that a teacher from the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District has ever won such a prestigious award. This is not the first time Mrs. Eshelman's Wolverine work in the Environmental Education Center, also widely known as the WEE Center, has caught the eye of New York State and the Allegany Farm Bureau. In 2018 the WEE Center was awarded the Allegany



Farm Bureau's Agriculture Promotion of the Year Award. The WEE Center has also received a Certificate of Recognition in 2018 from Senator Catharine Young's office, a Congressional Proclamation in 2018 from Congressman Tom Reed's office and a Citation in 2018 from New York State Assemblyman Joseph Gigilo's office.

This coming July, Mrs. Eshelman will go on to represent the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District on the national level in Des Moines, Iowa. During such a difficult school year, this announcement has added a much-needed positive highlight. I ask everyone to join with me in congratulating Mrs. Eshelman on all her hard work and creativity, which has brought such positive attention to our school district.

Message from the Superintendent

Dear Students, Parents, Faculty, Staff, and Members of the Bolivar-Richburg Community,

As I write this letter, I look back on what the past year has brought us all regarding changes. It will be one year this March that we had to close our doors to in-person learning and switch to virtual learning because of the COVID-19 pandemic. In September, we were happy to try to get to



some sort of normalcy and welcome our students back in the classroom for in-person and hybrid instruction. Every day we are open is a sign of success for our students and families. It is because of the hard work and dedication of administration, faculty, and staff at Bolivar-Richburg CS that we were able to accomplish this important task.

Things are slowly starting to return to normal, as over the last few weeks winter sports have returned to our buildings. We are now allowing spectators to our sporting events—two people per family, and we are streaming live as many games and matches possible so you can view safely at home. Students are starting to participate in clubs, mostly virtually—but it's a start. As a District, we continue to encourage our students to work hard and excel inside and outside of the classroom and throughout our community. School Budget Preparation:

The Board of Education and the administrative team are beginning to develop the budget for the 2021-2022 school year. This year we have to address this with no increase in New York State aid, while dealing with the increase in expenses related to the pandemic and virtual learning. In doing so, we are looking at the long-range financial success of the Bolivar-Richburg CSD. I'm confident we will be able to reach these goals, while minimally impacting the local taxpayers.

During this budget development process, our number one priority is to preserve a well-balanced educational experience for all of our students. This upcoming school year we will be focused on increasing academic supports and opportunities in our classrooms.

This future project will focus on several key areas including repairing/improving building infrastructure needs, such as roofs,

(Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) lab within our buildings. We are also looking at updating other instructional areas to help improve student learning. 

Qualifications for Membership on a School Board

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district; that is, a citizen of the United States; at least 18 years of age or older.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

Qualifications of Voters

To be a qualified voter you must be:

- A citizen of the United States.
- At least 18 years of age.
- A resident of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the vote

INFORMATION REGARDING NON-DESCRIMINATION

The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, military status, political affiliation, race, creed or religion, color, national origin, or disability in the employment and educational opportunities it offers, including career and technical educational opportunities as required by Title IX of the 1972 Educational Amendments and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973

The Board of Education affirms its compliance with those sections of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 dealing with program accessibility.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities in federally assisted programs or activities solely on the basis of disability. The District shall make its program and facilities accessible to all its students with disabilities.

The District shall also identify, evaluate and extend to every qualified student with a disability under Section 504 a free, appropriate public education, including modifications, accommodations, specialized instruction or related aids and services, as deemed necessary to meet their educational needs as adequately as the needs of non-disabled students are met.

Sexual Harassment of Students

The Board of Education affirms its commitment to non-discrimination and recognizes its responsibility to provide for all District students an environment that is free of sexual harassment and intimidation. Sexual harassment is a violation of law and stands in direct opposition to District policy. Therefore, the Board prohibits and condemns all forms of sexual harassment by employees, school volunteers, students, and non-employees such as contractors and vendors which occur on school grounds and at all school sponsored events, programs and activities including those that take place at locations off school premises or those that take place in another state. Generally, sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature when:

- a) Submission to or rejection of such sexually harassing conduct and/or communication by a student affects decisions regarding any aspect of the student's education, including participation in school-sponsored activities;
- b) Conditions exist within the school environment that allow or foster obscene pictures, lewd jokes, sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other harassing activities of a sexual nature; and
- c) Such conduct and/or communication has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance or participation in an educational or extracurricular activity, or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive learning; environment and/or effectively bars the student's access to an educational opportunity or benefit.

Complaint Process

Any student suspecting discrimination on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, military status, political affiliation, race, creed or religion, color, national origin, or disability may make a claim of discrimination using the procedure outlined below. Anyone who is aware of or has a complaint about sexual harassment should also follow this procedure. This claim or complaint is filed with the Superintendent/designee, who will assist with the complaint process if necessary. The following information should be included on the complaint.

- 1) The exact nature of the complaint actions, policies, or practices believed to be discriminatory and any person believed to be responsible.
- 2) The date, time and place of the alleged discriminatory action(s).
- 3) The names of witnesses or persons who have knowledge about the complaint.
- 4) Any available written documentation or evidence that is relevant to the complaint.
- 5) The actions that could be taken to correct the complaint.



The Superintendent/designee shall cause a review of the complaint to be conducted (including necessary meetings and interviews) and a written response mailed to the complainant within ten school days after receipt of the complaint. If it is agreed that discrimination occurred, corrective action will be taken to restore denied rights.

If there is not agreement, a written appeal may be submitted to the Board of Education indicating the reasons for disagreement. The Board of Education shall consider the appeal at its next regularly scheduled meeting following receipt of the appeal.

A complaint of illegal discrimination may also be filed with the Federal Office for Civil Rights, United States Department of Education.

The Elementary Principal

Dear Parents/Guardians,

As we continue to move through the year, I would like to remind you and encourage you as a parent to keep reading with your child for at least 20 minutes a day. This is truly the best thing that you can do for your child as a parent. There is power in reading as it supports their academic growth; but it also can be a nice quiet time together. Whether we are read to by the teacher, parent or a sibling, the feelings of relaxation and excitement surface. These reading experiences with your children are called read alouds. These read alouds are the very foundation of reading. Reading aloud with your children supports their development as readers and writers, fosters their love of reading, improves reading skills and abilities, and encourages children to read throughout their lives.

Virtual Learning:

At any given time we have had students on virtual learning. Whether your child is doing virtual learning continuously or whether they are virtual for a short period of time, I would like to remind everyone of the expectations. When students are on virtual learning, please make sure your child attends their grade level virtual schedule, is on time, that their video is on, and that they are in an area free from distractions. It is very important that students use appropriate behavior and follow the rules just as they were in school. This will be key to the success of your child's virtual experience.

Currently the NYS testing has not been cancelled, Please make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast on these testing dates. Please remember during the winter months that students still do go outside for recess, weather permitting. Please make sure to send to school the appropriate clothing for students. Students will be dismissed at 10:45 on Friday, March 12, due to a Superintendent's Conference afternoon.

Also, our spring break begins with no school on Friday, April 2, and students return to school on Monday, April 12, 2021.

State Testing Just Around the Corner!

NYS ELA Grades 3-8: April 20-22 NYS Math Grades 3-8: May 4-6 Grade 4 Science Performance Test- May 25- June 4 (exact date TBD) Grade 4 Science Written Test- June 7

Anticipated spring testing is just around the corner! At this time, we have not received anything from the state that spring testing will be cancelled for the 2021 school year. We will continue working with our students to prepare them as much as possible! State testing often brings angst for both parents and children. All parents want to see their children perform well in school. Parents play an important part in helping their children give their best performance on a test. The tips presented below may serve as a guideline for parents when helping their children prepare for testing.

During the weeks leading up to the test, begin to talk with your child about the importance of giving their best effort during testing. Practice with them, talk to their teachers to find out what areas they need more practice in, and most importantly READ with your child. Good reading skills will help your child with reading passages and will help them feel more confident. The following are tips to help you in preparing your child to do their best.

The night before:

- Help your child get to bed on time. Research shows that being well-rested helps students do better.
- Help children resolve immediate arguments before going to bed.
- Keep your routine as normal as possible. Upsetting natural routines may make children feel insecure.
- Mention the test to show you're interested, but don't dwell on it.
- Plan ahead to avoid conflicts on the morning of the test.

The morning of the test:

- Get up early to avoid rushing. Be sure to have your child at school on time.
- Have your child eat a good breakfast but not a heavy one. Re search shows that students do better if they have breakfast before they take tests.
- Be positive about the test. Acknowledge that tests can be hard and that they're designed so that no one will know all of the answers. Explain that doing your best is what counts. The important thing is to make your child comfortable and confident about the test.

After the test talk with your child about how it went. Praise them for doing their best, and reassure them that you are proud of them for giving their best effort.

We've been busy in 3PK!

Each day children explore the world around them through structured and unstructured play-based learning opportunities. Students are learning to interact with their peers, learning to use language when dealing with conflict, and most importantly—how to be a good friend.

Through the last few months, our themes have included animals, kindness, winter,

and dinosaurs. Our Pre-K library helps to reinforce these themes with book choices in the classroom as well as books that students choose to "check out" each week. Thank you, Miss Julie for being our classroom librarian!

March will bring us to our spring unit where we will explore the signs of spring, weather changes, and how plants grow. We'll also sprinkle in some Dr. Seuss activities when we celebrate his birthday.



March will be an exciting month! We will start off by celebrating Dr. Seuss's birthday. We'll do several activities with a variety of his rhyming books. The students will become authors and illustrators of their own rhyming book—which they can read! Full Day Pre-K

Greetings from the full day Pre-K classes! We have been super busy in full day Pre-K! The students have worked hard on writing their names as well as identifying their names. They are learning to identify their classmates' names. The students are working on learning the letters in their names by building, writing, and painting their names.

In December, students learned all about "Families and Communities." We had so much fun learning all about families and how they love us and help us grow and change! Students also learned about family traditions and celebrations, communities, and community helpers. Students had the opportunity to share with the class some of their family's holiday traditions. Thank you to all the families that helped with these projects—they were fantastic! Thank you to all of our families who made a gingerbread with their child at home and sent in for the hallway decorations! It was so nice to see all the different gingerbread while we learned the Classic Tale: "The Gingerbread Man".

In January and February, your child learned all about "Animals." The students learned the name of many animals, how animals' body parts help them survive, and animal baby names and their mothers. They even took a closer look at all of the animals they have learned about and sorted them into groups of animals, such as birds, insects, fish, and mammals. Students also worked on practicing telling stories, learning nursery rhymes, rhyming, alphabet letters/sounds, drawing, and writing their names and even some animal names.

In math, students explored two- and three-dimensional shapes and objects. They learned to identify circles, triangles, squares, and rectangles. Students continue to work on counting up to 20, one-to-one correspondence, counting a set of objects to tell "how many" up to 10, and number recognition 6-10.

Kindergarten

We have been working in Kindergarten! In our ELA Kings and Queens unit, we learned all about what royal kings and queens do as rulers. All of the princes and princesses dressed up for a Royal Tea Party. In our ELA Columbus and the Pilgrims unit, we learned about the adventures Columbus made to the New World.



We also learned about the pilgrimage the Pilgrims made, and the creation of the First Thanksgiving. We wrapped the unit up with a Boat Race between the kindergarten classes using the four ships: Niña, Pinta, Santa María, and the Mayflower. Each class worked so hard and made it to America. We are looking forward to our next

two units: Colonial Towns and Townspeople, and Presidents and American Symbols.

We have been learning about all of the consonants, short vowels, long vowels, digraphs and vowel pairs. Knowing these sounds has helped us in reading and writing. We continue to practice writing star-worthy letters and numbers.




Our First-Grade astronauts have touched back down on Earth from their trip to space. Boys and girls learned






Fifth Grade Math

to math homework to increase their knowledge and understanding of math concepts. Keep up the good work 5th grade! I am very proud of you!


Fifth Grade ELA

Tips for parents and students to help stay on top of remote learning

These basic tasks will assist you in staying current and up to date regarding your student's grades, attendance, homework assignments, deadlines, and information sent out to students from teachers, counselors, and other staff.

- Utilize the parent portal every day to monitor your child's homework completion, attendance, and grades. The Guidance Office is glad to help set up accounts, reset passwords, etc. with the portal which is a helpful tool. You can even add it as a mobile device phone app and it is then at your fingertips to check!
- Ask your child to share with you their Microsoft
 Teams log in (username and password) so that you
 can view what assignments and messages they have inside of
 Teams. This is where teachers are linking students'work
 electronically. Teams does not currently have a parent/
 guardian view-only option for their software platform,
 unfortunately.
- Make sure your child has turned on the notifications for every Microsoft Team they are a member of to receive immediate notification messages so that they are aware when staff are sending out not only assignments, but other important messages.

IF NOTIFICATIONS ARE OFF, YOUR CHILD IS PROBABLY MISSING OUT ON IMPORTANT AND HELPFUL INFORMATION.

- Contact your child's teachers and counselors if you need assistance.
- Evaluate if full virtual learning is working for your child or not. If not, the door is open for them to come back to in-person hybrid learning any time this spring semester. WE TRULY MISS AND WANT YOUR CHILDREN IN OUR BUILDING IN PERSON.
- Help your child have a quiet, distraction-free learning space at home as much as it is possible.

STAR Credit and Exemption

From the Desk of Kristin Woodhead, School Business Manager:

Why switch to the STAR credit from the STAR exemption

If you currently receive your STAR benefit as a reduction on your school tax bill (the STAR exemption), you may receive a greater benefit if you switch to the STAR credit to receive a check instead. Beginning in 2019, the value of the STAR credit savings may increase by as much as 2% each year, but the value of the STAR exemption savings cannot increase. The STAR exemption savings can never exceed the STAR credit savings.

The STAR credit benefit can continue to grow

By switching to the STAR credit, your benefit could grow by as much as 2% each year, and it can never be lower than the STAR exemption benefit.

For example, if your STAR exemption benefit was \$800 on your 2018-2019 school tax bill, that's the most you can receive in any coming years, unless you switch to the STAR credit.

If you switch to the STAR credit, your benefit can grow by as much as 2% each year.

- In the first year, that could mean up to \$816—an extra \$16 in savings.
- Five years later, the STAR credit benefit could reach as high as \$900 due to the power of compounding,

STAR benefits can change each year

Whether you're receiving the STAR credit or exemption, the benefit can change each year due to a variety of factors, including school tax rates, changes in property values in your community, and local assessment practices.

As a result, the STAR credit benefit may not always increase, and when it does increase, it may do so by 2% or less.

However, the STAR exemption benefit can never increase, even when the STAR credit benefit does increase. The STAR exemption benefit will never be higher than the STAR credit benefit.

How much will I save?

To determine how much you could save by switching to the STAR credit:

- 1. Find the amount of your STAR savings on your 2019-2020 school tax bill. (View sample property tax bills.)
- 2. Multiply your 2019-2020 STAR savings by 1.02 to see how high your STAR credit benefit can be this year if you switch to the credit.

Property owners switching from STAR Exemption to STAR credit must now do so by May 1 (previous deadline was June 15).



SAT AND ACT UPDATE FOR COLLEGE-BOUND SOPHOMORES AND JUNIORS

Due to the pandemic, many SAT and ACT tests sessions have been cancelled for safety reasons. Therefore, many colleges have gone "test optional" for current seniors and juniors who are preparing to apply to college. Test optional means you MAY submit an SAT or ACT score if you have one, but that it is not required to apply. It is recommended that juniors take at least one ACT or SAT in the spring so that you have an official test score just in case you need one.

We have given the P-SAT and PreACT already this year to any interested sophomores and juniors free of charge that wished to take these practice exams to familiarize themselves with the test time limits and style of questions. Pre-ACT score reports have just arrived and will be given to students soon.

Students should register for these tests on-line at www.actstudent.org for the ACT and www.sat.collegeboard.org/register for the SAT. I am glad to assist if students run into technical problems while trying to complete their registrations. If a student normally qualifies for free or reduced lunch or receives government financial assistance, I can give him/her a fee waiver, which waives the fees to take the SAT and the ACT exam twice during their junior or senior year. Students need to request fee waivers in person at the Guidance Office.

Students may test as many times as they would like, and colleges will consider the highest test scores.
