Jessica has received numerous academic honors and awards including: the Alfred University Scholar Award, the University of Rochester Bausch and Lomb Science Award, the RIT Innovation and Creativity Award, RIT Performing Arts Scholarship, DAR Daughters of the America Revolution Award, the RPI Medal, SAT and ACT Club and the Clarkson Achievement Award. She is a National Honor Society member who scored 1450 on the SAT and has received the Superintendent's Award and high honor roll throughout her entire high school career.




Kindergarten News Miss Hackett, Mrs. Stutzman and Mrs. Windus

First Grade News: Visit to the Challenger Learning Center

At the end of March, first graders travelled to Allegany, NY to spend the day at the Challenger Learning Center. Before visiting, first graders worked hard learning about space, including different constellations, planets, the moon, and what causes night and day, along with the different phases of the moon. This field trip provided an excellent hands-on learning experience!

Students got to be astronauts, scientists, and engineers throughout the day. They experienced a space shuttle simulation where they donned helmets and gloves. When they landed they got to check

out a new planet and determine if it is safe for humans to live on. They got busy digging through rocks, looking for animals, signs of water, plants, and shelter. Students found spiders, shells, and many other small creatures! The astronauts decided to tell NASA that they should investigate the planet more.

Before entering the lab as scientists, students put on lab coats and then participated in different experiments where they had to follow directions and use math to help them complete the experiments. From sorting and classifying bugs, to naming constellations, to weighing different objects scientists had to work together to be successful.

Lastly, students got to be engineers as they studied light that reflects and refracts and thought of different objects in everyday life that reflects or refracts. They got to observe how mirrors reflect light. Students also learned about sun dials and got to make one themselves, using a flashlight to imitate the sun to show what time it is using the sun dial.

Exclamations of "I want to be an astronaut!" and "This is awesome!" could be heard throughout the Challenger Learning Center.



Wow! It's hard to believe that the end of the school year is approaching! Second graders have been working very hard the past few months!

We just completed a Tournament of Books with First Grade. Over the course of 2 weeks, students heard and voted on 16 different books, dwindling it down to the elite 8, the final four, until it finally came down to The Book With No Pictures and There's a Dragon in Your Book. The winner of the Tournament of Books is The Book With No Pictures!

In reading, students have heard and learned about The Civil War, The Human Body, Immigration, and Fighting for a Cause. They have also read about a knight named Sir Gus and how his luck has gotten him through many tricky situations. Ask your child to share their favorite Sir Gus story. Second graders have also been learning about the schwa sound (it says short u, but is spelled with 'a' or 'e') and different sounds and spellings with the schwa (el, al, il, tion). Students have been learning about adjectives, subjects and predicates, and the different verb tenses (past, present, future). Please continue to read together at home for at least 20 minutes every night.

In math, students have learned how to graph data using a bar graph and picture graph. Second graders can now count coins and dollar bills and solve one and two-step word problems involving money. Students have learned how to measure in centimeters, inches, meters, and yards. Students are continually working on mastering their math facts with sums and differences within 20. Please work on math facts within 20 (both addition and subtraction) at home.

Happy Birthday to all those students who celebrated a birthday in March, April, May, June, July, and August. Have a great rest of the school year!

Of course, April 1 was also April Fool's Day. Ask your son or daughter about the pranks in their room.
















Elementary PE Corner Mrs. Auman and Mr. Pettit

in class we are using a vertical tower garden to observe seeds. It is a large tower that holds little seed pods that has constant water and light to enhance growing. We are starting out with some simple flowers, and then going for some veggies to grow and eat. We are hoping that we can get a school garden growing soon. Next in science, we will be learning about different types of waves, and reviewing for the science state tests at the end of May. We really were busy the past few months and plan on continuing the fun!

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a public hearing of the qualified voters of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District, Allegany County, Bolivar, New York (the "District") will be held in the secondary building in the District, located at 100 School Street, Bolivar, NY 14715 on Tuesday, May 3, 2022, at 6 p.m. prevailing time, for presentation of the District's proposed 2022-2023 budget.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Annual Meeting and Vote of the qualified voters of the District will be held on Tuesday, May 17, 2022, between the hours of 12:00 p.m. (noon) and 8 p.m., prevailing time, in the secondary building in the District, located at 100 School Street, Bolivar, NY 14715, at which time the polls will be opened for the purposes of voting on the budget for the 2022-2023 school year and six (6) additional propositions, electing two (2) members of the Board of Education for three-year terms to commence on July 1, 2022, and any other matters as may be lawfully presented at the meeting:

PROPOSITIONS

Proposition 1 – Annual Budget:

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the budget for the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District in the amount of \$21,178,283.00 for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2022 and ending June 30, 2023, as presented by the Board of Education, is hereby approved and adopted and the requisite portion thereof will be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the District to be levied and collected as required by law.

Proposition 2 – Purchase of Three (3) School Buses:

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the Bolivar-Richburg Central District in Allegany County, New York is hereby authorized

to purchase three (3) new school buses for use in the transportation program of the District, at an estimated maximum cost of \$382,935.84, using \$382,935.84 of funds currently on hand in the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District Capital (Transportation) Reserve Fund.

Proposition 3 – Establishment of a Transportation Reserve Fund for the Acquisition of School Buses and Similar Vehicles (and Related Equipment):

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District, Allegany County, New York (the "District") is hereby authorized to establish a new capital reserve fund (the "Fund") for the acquisition of various school buses, school bus-type vans/ minivans, and similar vehicles (and related equipment) for use in the transportation program of the District, all pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York; that the Fund shall be known as the "Transportation Reserve Fund, 2022"; that the ultimate amount of the Fund shall be not greater than \$4,000,000 (plus interest earned thereon); that the probable term of the Fund shall be not longer than ten (10) years; and that the permissible sources from which the Board is authorized to appropriate monies to the Fund from time to time shall be (A) amounts applied thereto from budgetary appropriations of the District; (B) unappropriated fund balance of the District as directed by the Board; (C) to the extent specifically directed by the Board, State aid received as reimbursement for transportation-related expenditures by the District (whether or not such expenditures were financed in whole or in part from the Fund); (D) proceeds from the sale of real or personal property owned by the District, if permitted by law and if directed by the Board; and (E) such other sources as the Board or the voters of the District may direct from time to time, all a may be permitted by law.

Proposition 4 – Establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for the Acquisition of Vehicles, Machinery and Equipment for use in the Buildings and Grounds Maintenance Program:

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District, Allegany County, New York (the "District") is hereby authorized to establish a new capital reserve fund (the "Fund") for the acquisition of vehicles, machinery and equipment for use in the buildings and grounds maintenance program of the District, pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York; that the Fund shall be known as the "Buildings and Grounds Vehicles, Machinery and Equipment Reserve Fund, 2022"; that the ultimate amount of the Fund shall be not greater than \$400,000 (plus interest earned thereon); that the probable term of the Fund shall be not longer than ten (10) years; and that the permissible sources from which the Board is authorized to appropriate monies to the Fund from time to time shall be (A) amounts applied thereto from budgetary appropriations of the District; (B) unappropriated fund balance of the District, as may be directed by the Board; (C) proceeds from the sale of unneeded real or personal property owned by the District, if permitted by law and if so directed by the Board; and (D) such other sources as the Board or the voters of the District may direct from time to time, all as may be permitted by law.

Proposition 5 – Bolivar Free Library Taxes:

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the annual appropriation for the operation of the Bolivar Free Library, Bolivar, New York, a free association library, is hereby increased by \$8,500.00 for a total of \$48,500.00, and that the Board of Education of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District is hereby authorized to levy and collect taxes in the School District for payment thereof.

<u>Proposition 6 – Colonial Library Taxes:</u>

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the annual appropriation for the operation of the Colonial Library, Richburg, New York, a free association library, is hereby increased by \$2,041.75

for a total of \$42,876.75, and that the Board of Education of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District is hereby authorized to levy and collect taxes in the School District for payment thereof.

Proposition 7 – Genesee Library Taxes:

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the annual appropriation for the operation of the Genesee Library, Little Genesee, New York, a free association library, is hereby increased by \$1,913.00 for a total of \$40,159.00, and that the Board of Education of the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District is hereby authorized to levy and collect taxes in the School District for the payment thereof.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election for members of the Board of Education shall be held to fill two (2) at-large vacancies on the Board created by the expiration, on June 30, 2022, of the terms of Board members Kami Doane and Amanda McDonnell. The candidates receiving, respectively, the largest and second-largest number of votes shall each be elected to three-year terms commencing upon election and expiring on June 30, 2025.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be nominated by petition. Petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education shall be filed in the office of the District Clerk in the District's secondary building between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., not later than 5 p.m. on April 18, 2022. Each petition shall be directed to the District Clerk and must be signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District, or 2% of the number of voters who voted in the 2021 annual election, and must state the residence of each signer and the name and residence of each candidate.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that applications for absentee ballots for the Annual Meeting and Vote may be obtained between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, from the District Clerk. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk



no later than 5 p.m., prevailing time on Tuesday, May 17, 2022. A list of all persons to whom absentee ballots shall have been issued will be available in the office of the District Clerk, where it shall be open for inspection by any qualified voter of the District between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3 p.m., until the day set for voting, except Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. No absentee ballot will be canvassed and counted unless it is received in the office of the District Clerk prior to 5:00 p.m. prevailing time on May 17, 2022.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that military voters who are qualified voters of the District, including eligible family members, must submit a separate application for a military ballot by requesting an application from the District Clerk. For a military voter to be issued a military ballot, the military ballot application must be received in the office of the District Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on April 21, 2022. In a request for a military ballot application or ballot, military voters, including eligible family members, may designate a preference for receiving the application or ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail. If no preference is given, the military ballot application or ballot will be transmitted to the military voter by mail.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the qualified voters of the District shall be entitled to vote at said annual vote and election. A qualified voter is one who is (1) a citizen of the United States of America, (2) eighteen years of age or older, and (3) resident within the District for a period of 30 days next preceding the Annual Meeting and Vote. The District may require all persons offering to vote at the Annual Meeting and Vote to provide one form of proof of residency pursuant to Education Law §2018-c. Such form may include a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name, and address.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that pursuant to a rule adopted by the Board of Education in accordance with §§2035 and 2008 of the State Education Law, any referenda or propositions to amend the budget, otherwise to be submitted for voting at said election, must be filed with the Bolivar-Richburg Central School Board of Education at the secondary building on or before April 18, 2022 at 5 p.m. prevailing time; must be typed or printed in English, must be directed to the District Clerk and signed by at least 16 qualified voters of the

District and must state the name and residence of each signer. However, the Bolivar-Richburg Central School Board of Education will not entertain any petition to place before the voters any proposition the purpose of which is not within the powers of the voters to determine, or any proposition which fails to include a specific appropriation where the expenditure of monies is required by the proposition.

a copy of budget or statement of the amount of money which will be required to fund the School District's budget for 2022-2023, exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any resident of the District during the 14 days immediately preceding the Annual Meeting and Vote, except Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, and on the day of the Annual Meeting and Vote, at the office of the District Clerk or any District schoolhouse during the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 p.m.






