

Hello, BRES Families!

As always, I cannot believe how quickly the school year is going. We have had a lot of fun in the elementary so far and have continued to make many improvements to better our students' experiences. We have rolled out our new PBIS program, have continued to work on providing academic interventions for more students, and are offering enriching opportunities like our upcoming trip to Shea's to see Aladdin.

The holidays are quickly approaching. Shortly we will be partaking in celebrations with family and friends. We have a lot to celebrate this year at BRES!

Each year, CA BOCES provides Districts with an outline of student performance data in relation to the recent NYS 3-8 ELA and Math Assessments. The outline compares our student mastery percentage and BOCES ranking over a five-year trajectory (2016 to 2022, excluding the COVID years). This year, Bolivar-Richburg Elementary was presented with some great news in relation to student performance. In five out of six of our assessment areas, we improved our student mastery percentage and BOCES ranking significantly. For example, in 2016 we ranked 18th out of 21 Districts in the BOCES region based on our NYS ELA 5 performance, but our results from the 2022 assessment have placed us 9th out of 21 Districts!

As a District, we are proud of the improvements we have made in the most recent years. We continue to have work to do, but wanted to take a moment to celebrate our staff's hard work and our students' successes. Thank you for your continued support of Bolivar-Richburg Elementary.

In math, we've explored counting, patterning, matching, identifying more/less and similarities/differences.

October brought School Safety Week as well as Fire Prevention Week. Our Weekly Readers have helped us to identify actions to take in order to stay safe in our schools and in our homes. We practiced fire drills and talked about creating a meeting place for all family members to meet in case of a fire at home. October also brought on the start of our weekly visits to the Bolivar Free Library. Mrs. Fuller welcomes our class each week and shares many great books!

We ended the month of October with a week full of Halloween tricks and treats. Treats were exchanged and students were excited to share their plans for their evening of trick-or-treating. We are all looking forward to the upcoming months and the endless learning opportunities headed our way!



Full Day Pre-K News Miss Glover and Mrs. Mitchell

We had a great start to the school year in full day Pre-K! In September, we did a lot of name activities as well as "getting to know each other" activities. It was so much fun getting to know all of the students. Our first reading unit was "All About Me." The students learned about naming the five senses as well as the corresponding body part. The students had so much fun painting and creating life sized cut outs of themselves!

This month, the students learned all about "Families and Communities." We had so much fun learning all about families and how they love us and help us grow and change! Students also learned about family traditions and celebrations, communities, and community helpers.

In the next couple of months, we will be working on Classic Tales such as "The Lion and the Mouse," "The Elves and the Shoemaker," and "The Gingerbread Man." In math we have been working on numbers 1-5, sorting objects by color, shape, size, and we have been identifying groups that are the same and different.

First Grade Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Ordway, and Miss Perkins

Happy Fall! First graders have had a busy start to the year! In Math, they have been learning more about how addition and subtraction are related and writing correct number sentences. They also learned about the value of the equal sign and how to balance equations! (ex. 5 + 1 = 4 + 2)

In Reading, they have been reviewing all their letters and sounds and learning new tricky words. Tricky words are words that have parts in them that do not follow the rules so we have to learn that part by heart. They have been working hard at breaking words up by their sounds and then blending them back together to say the word. They have also heard many fables and learned what is a moral, or lesson. Students also have been busy learning about different body systems such as circulatory, skeletal, nervous, digestive, and muscular. They have learned the importance of eating healthy and washing their hands!

Lastly, students got to investigate apples. They learned about the life cycle of an apple tree, tasted foods made with apples, weighed and measured apples, made applesauce, and tasted 3 different kinds of apples. We are looking forward to more fun and learning in first grade!













Second Grade Mrs. Livingston, Miss Gerard, Mrs. O'Neil, and Miss Bradley

We've had a busy start to second grade!

In reading, students have heard and learned about Fairy Tales and Tall Tales, Ancient Greek Civilizations, and Greek Myths. They have also read stories about a sneaky cat bandit, along with reading trickster tales and fables. 2nd graders have been busy learning many new phonics sounds and spellings, including oi, oy, ou, ow, oo, ar, er, or, and long and short vowels. They have been working on developing the skill of going back into the text to find their evidence for the answer. Students

have been learning how to retell a story using a graphic organizer that identifies character, setting, beginning, middle, and end. Seond graders have also learned how to determine the moral of a story.

In math, students are working hard on developing their understanding of place value within 1000. They are learning to count within 1000 using a variety of strategies to skip count by 10s and 100s from any number. Students are learning that each digit in a 3-digit number represents the amount of hundreds, tens, and ones. They are learning how to compare 3-digit numbers represented in all forms (number form, word form, expanded form, and unit form). Students are continually working on mastering their math facts with

sums and differences within 20. Please work on math facts within 20 at home.

Students have been learning about how to write complete sentences, making sure to use capitals and punctuation. Second graders have been working on varying their sentences using different types of punctuation. They have also learned about using quotation marks in their writing. Second graders have also been learning about RADD when answering short response questions. R=restate the question, A=answer in a complete sentence, D=detail to support answer.

Third Grade Mrs. Hackett

In third grade we have settled into our classroom, found old friends and made new friends. Time seems to be flying already! Speaking of time, we started our unit on telling time to the nearest minute and solving word problems with elapsed time. We have also been learning how to multiply and divide numbers! Learning how to do this is always so fun and exciting. We have found a way to make word problems more fun by getting our favorite games involved. In ELA, students are learning how people in other countries access books and gain the power of knowledge. We just finished up our country projects and have learned so much! We continue to work on our summarizing, clarifying, predicting, and questioning the texts. We start chapter books next! It's going to be awesome!!



Fourth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Bentley

This year just started, and I feel like we have already done so much! In Social Studies, we have learned about the geography of NY. We have been making maps, learning about the Erie Canal, and so much more! Our next unit is on Native Americans of NY. On the 18th we had a presenter, Dave Ruch, come in to teach us more about the Native Americans with his guitar!

In Science, we have been focusing on the Earth and how it has formed into what it is today. We have done some experiments with sugar cubes showing how weathering affects rocks, and using Starburst to show how rocks form! We also received a video sent to us from a real geologist who studies volcanoes! She is the niece of an employee here at B-R and has her doctorate in geology! She made the 4th graders their very own presentation about what her job is like! It was interactive and full of information!

Also, for the month of October, we have a "Student Spotlight" in fourth grade. Students vote on each other for kids showing characteristics of PAWS. For the month of October, we recognized Sammy Dunn, Allison Abdo, and Kaidence Palmer. Congratulations to the three of them!

Fourth Grade ELA Mrs. Bell

Mrs. Bell's 4th grade class has been busy learning all about the Native Americans of New York State. Students have had a lot of fun learning about the Iroquois culture. One of their projects was to create a wampum belt that showed symbols in their own life. These were all displayed in the hallway for a few weeks to show off what a great job they did. We have also been working hard at being strong writers! They are doing a great job at writing strong paragraphs using details from the text to support their writing. Way to start the school year off strong 4th graders!


Fourth Grade Math Miss Ferris

In fourth grade math, we just wrapped up Module 1: Place Value. We have now moved onto Module 3 which is a lot about multiplication and division. The students are doing well and learning a lot! Many of them have mastered their multiplication facts. We are looking forward to an exciting holiday season and ringing in 2023.

Fifth Grade ELA Mrs. Smith

ELA class has been filled with lots of reading and writing! Our guided reading groups are running smoothly, as we focus on fiction and nonfiction texts. We have been reading the novel Esperanza Rising by Pam Munoz Ryan. Set in the early 1930s, twenty years after the Mexican Revolution and during the Great Depression, Esperanza Rising tells the story of a young Mexican girl's courage and resourcefulness when at the age of thirteen she finds herself living in a strange new world. Esperanza, whose name means "hope" in Spanish, must rise again into a resourceful and responsible young woman. My hope is that this novel teaches us the value of human rights, to persevere when faced with obstacles, and to treat others with dignity and respect!

Our "Wolverine PAWS" recipients certainly make us proud! Congratulations to Crimson Kron and Presley Robinson. In order to be selected, students must go above and beyond to help others and show good character traits.



Fifth Grade Math Miss Johnston

In Miss Johnston's 5th grade math class, we have been learning about place values and decimals. The topics that we have been covering include rounding, completing patterns, converting measurements, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing decimals, as well as solving word problems. Students have been working together to solve the math problems and discuss the different ways to solve the problems. Students are using background knowledge from previous lessons to help them solve the lessons and make connections to other topics we have learned. Within the next few weeks, we will be focusing on solving expressions and solving multiplication and division problems with multidigit numbers and decimals.

Fifth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Hillman

We have had a busy, productive, and fun start to this school year. Fifth graders have been hard at work in science learning about matter with our science unit "Chemistry in the Kitchen." We have conducted many exciting experiments to find evidence to prove matter is made of particles too small to be seen. We will soon be exploring whether mixing two or more substances will result in a new substance. Ask your child to share with you some of the experiments we have done in class!

In social studies, we have been flying through our geography unit. We started by identifying the continents of the world and then the Western Hemisphere. The students all worked hard to conduct research and present to the class information about a country in the Western Hemisphere. These projects turned out amazing! We are now beginning to label the 50 states and will soon be exploring how geography affects the way that we live.

Middle/High School News

Steve Jobs once said, "The people who are crazy enough to think they can change the world are the ones who do."

I saw this quote in a random magazine last month and it immediately reminded me of our teachers and staff here at BRCS. I am sure you are well aware of how difficult it is to find teachers these days, and I have met with many community members who tell me, "I don't know how you teachers do it every day!" It is an extremely challenging profession that offers no consistency. In fact, the only constant is change! And it is true, it takes an extremely unique person to choose the teaching profession, especially those who dedicate their entire life to the job, but I think I know the secret to why they do what they do...CHANGE!

The goal here at Bolivar-Richburg is to create a wave of change. A new way of thinking, a new way of learning, and a new way to embrace our future. We have worked hard as a family to break the addiction of cell phones and social media. We are currently revamping our Response to Intervention (RTI) in our Middle School to help bridge the learning gaps of our 6th, 7th, and 8th graders. We have reintroduced frameworks for our Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), which offered students a chance to dress up for Halloween and for some to participate in fun games and activities during advisement. We offered a six-day, all expense paid trip for our Juniors to Washington, D.C., where they sat front seat to the mid-term elections and learned how to be more active in our local, state, and federal government.

The driving force behind this wave of change are our teachers and staff. They do the heavy lifting on a daily basis, understanding that the steps might not be big, but we are moving in the right direction!

My hope is that you will join us on this journey. How can you change? How can you help? If you're willing, I simply ask for your support. Our students need good role models. They need community members who teach them the importance of working as a team to reach our collaborative goals. They need fans in the stands who cheer for them and demonstrate great sportsmanship. They need parents who hold them to higher standards and help them solve their problems. They need a family they can depend on, even when the road gets rough.

I have been blessed to see this process in motion, and it is my job to keep it moving forward. I want to thank our entire BRCS community for the support and understanding through these first ten weeks of change. The example you set serves as the blueprint for our children!

With a smartphone using the web browser go to rmd.at/guidancebr. Then follow the instructions to sign up for and download the Remind mobile app. Mrs. Bean will be sending information to high school parents and students via this app. Example: field trip slips, reminders of college rep visits, deadlines, Pre-ACTs, military reps, booklets on financial aid etc. Remind also allows you to text Mrs. Bean back with individualized questions.

Tips For Parents to Help Stay on Top of Your Child's Schooling

These basic tasks will assist you in staying current and up to date regarding your student's grades, attendance, homework assignments, deadlines, social-emotional state, and information sent out to students from teachers, counselors and other staff.

- <u>Utilize the parent portal every day</u> to monitor your child's homework completion, attendance, and grades. The Guidance Office is glad to help set up accounts with the portal. You can even add it as a mobile device phone app and it is then at your fingertips to check! You can email teachers directly through the portal.
- Ask your child to share with you their Microsoft Teams login (username and password) so that you can view what assignments and messages they have inside of Teams. This is where teachers may link students' work electronically. Teams does not currently have a parent/guardian view-only option for their software platform unfortunately.
- Make sure your child has turned on the notifications for every Microsoft Team they are a member of to receive immediate notification messages so that they are aware when staff are sending out not only assignments, but other important messages. IF NOTIFICATIONS ARE OFF, YOUR CHILD IS PROBABLY MISSING OUT AN A GREAT AMOUNT OF IMPORTANT AND HELPFUL INFORMATION.
- Monitor your child's use of Teams Chat feature to make sure they are utilizing it respectfully and responsibly.
- Contact your child's teachers and counselors if you need assistance.
- Help your child have a quiet, distraction-free learning space at home as much as it is possible.
- Assist your child in creating a school daily calendar with their paper planners or electronically in Teams
- "ROSES AND THORNS" DAILY CHECK IN: Every day, check in and ask your child how their day was. What was the "rose" or best part of the day? What was the low point or "thorn" of their day? As counselors, we are currently flooded with students coming in needing to speak about stressors, anxiety, and depression this year. Family members taking some time each day to check in with your child about their day is a critical support that all students need. Do not assume that your child is coping well if they are quiet. Please talk openly and often about their school days.

PLEASE REACH OUT FOR SUPPORT IF YOUR CHILD IS STRUGGLING EMOTIONALLY OR ACADEMICALLY! WE WANT TO HELP IF WE CAN AND REALIZE THESE ARE CHALLENGING TIMES!

JANUARY REGENTS EXAMS SCHEDULED

January Regents exams may be given throughout the state on January 24-27, 2023. Students must see Mrs. Crandall-Bean at once to be sure that their name is placed on the test roster if they would like to retake a Regents examination either to earn a passing score or if they want to retest to try and improve scores on previously taken regents exams. There is no charge for a student to re-take a Regents exam in January. Please note that New York State regulations do not allow students to be admitted to a morning exam after 10:00 a.m. or to an afternoon exam after 2:00 p.m. In addition, no student may leave an exam before those same times. This regulation is in place to prevent students from sharing information about an exam.





PowerSchool Parent Portal

Parents of 6-12th grade students who have not yet set up a PowerSchool parent portal account or need assistance resetting your current accounts, please feel free to



contact your child's counselor at 928-2915 (Ms. Scott, grades 6-9) or 928-2985 (Mrs. Crandall-Bean, grades, 10-12) to obtain directions along with your child's portal codes. The portal allows you to view on-line, 24-7, your child's current grades, attendance, and lunch account balances. Parents have the ability to add all of your students on to one single portal account. Students are all given their own student account when they begin grade 6 and are encouraged to self-monitor their own academic progress. Our goal this year is to have 100% of our 6-12 students and parents using portal accounts. We hope you will take advantage of this great tool that can be very helpful to stay up to date on grades and attendance and homework assignments.

There is also a PowerSchool phone app that parents and students can use. The free app can be obtained through the App Store or the Google Play store. The BRCS school code is CRKT. Many students and parents use the portal phone app to stay on top of their academic information, as it is a wonderful communication tool!

Alfred University College Campus Visit For Juniors and Seniors

On October 5, forty-six Bolivar-Richburg juniors and seniors visited Alfred University. Students received

an admissions overview presentation, toured the

campus, and ate lunch in the Dining Hall. Raina Bowen and Matt Mitchell, two members of the BR Class of 2022 and who both now attend Alfred, joined us for lunch and shared their experiences of life at AU. Alfred University has one of the top art programs in the country and produces over 50% of all ceramic engineers in the entire world. We are lucky to be so close to this institution!



We will be offering the Pre-ACT practice exam for interested sophomores and juniors this December. We will have 20 tests available at no cost. Student must sign up in the Guidance Office. The Pre-ACT practice exam was given on

October 12 to interested students.

College-bound juniors are encouraged to consider taking the SAT or the ACT in the spring and seniors are encouraged to take one of these exams this fall.

Many counselors feel the ACT is a fairer exam for many students as it is based on student achievement. Colleges accept ACT scores equal to SAT scores. Registration documents for both tests are available in the Guidance Office and on the Guidance website to assist students with the on-line registration process. Registering on-line is relatively simple, convenient and will allow students to receive their test scores quickly.

Test optional – What does that mean? Due to COVID's indoor large group gathering restrictions, many SAT and ACT exams were cancelled or limited in test seats. Therefore, 84% of colleges have remained "test-optional," meaning no SAT or ACT is required for college applications to their institutions. Many colleges may remain test optional in the future after COVID restrictions are lightened. However, to be safe it does not hurt to take at least one SAT or ACT exam in case it is needed in the future for college acceptance and scholarship contests.





Alfred State College Campus Visit For Juniors and Seniors

On October 27, forty-eight juniors and seniors visited Alfred State College. They sat through an admissions overview providing them basic importation about applying and selecting colleges, toured campus, and ate lunch in the leadership building. Several students spent the day on the Wellsville campus shadowing in their classrooms of interests such as carpentry and heavy equipment operations. Alfred State offers numerous degrees and programs and is close enough for our B-R students to commute and obtain a quality education at an affordable price.



College Reps, Fairs and Visits

This year we were able to hold our annual ACCA College Fair at Houghton University on September 27. BR juniors and seniors were able to speak with around 50 college representatives.

The Guidance Office is hosting many individual college reps in person in our office—as well as some virtually—this fall. The list is available in Teams and Remind for students and parents and is shared during morning announcements. Mrs. Crandall-Bean is glad to help students with college exploration applications and setting up in-person and virtual visits.

Seniors Make Future Plans

I will soon meet with all seniors individually to: review transcripts and make corrections if needed. determine what specific courses and regents exams are still needed to be passed for graduation, discuss posthigh school plans, and map out the tasks they need to complete for their career plans. Each student will be given an individualized folder of tasks to complete for their specific postsecondary career, military or college plan. Those students who are interested in college may have been given handouts about selecting and applying to colleges. It is highly recommended that seniors try to complete their college application(s) by the end of **Thanksgiving recess**. Please note: some programs may require students to apply However, some programs require students to apply earlier to ensure that their program of choice is not filled to capacity. Watch all application deadlines! Students are welcome to have their applications proofread in the Guidance Office prior to submitting them. Also, since most students are now applying on-line, it is vitally important that they let me or my secretary know each time they apply so that we mail or upload the student's official transcript. Colleges require an official transcript of high school grades and will not process a student's college application until they have received one.

"Senior Fall To- Do List," "Basics of Financial Aid," and "Scholarship Searches" presentations can be found electronically on the high school guidance website and will be pushed out to students in grades 11 & 12 in Microsoft Teams.

Important Financial Aid Information

In the past, the FAFSA application portal (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) has opened on January 1. This portal is how students qualify for free federal grant money and for federal student loans at low interest rates. The FAFSA portal now opens earlier on October 1 each year. This allows families a greater amount of time to be wise consumers regarding college costs and reviewing financial aid award letters before making a college commitment by the May 1 national commitment date.

Financial aid is very detail-oriented so if you have questions, do not hesitate to call the Guidance Office or any college financial aid office for assistance.

Two of the best resources for parents to find more information on this process are at the Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC) website (www.hesc.org) and at www.finaid.org. These two sites are loaded with information for parents and are two of the very best and easiest to navigate. Further, these sites are not just for parents of seniors but also for parents of any students who are considering college.

Lastly, parents (or students) should not feel the need to pay for help with financial aid forms or for scholarship searches. Oftentimes the services that advertise to help you with these are frauds or, at the very least, a rip-off. They often promise students thousands of dollars in financial aid. The rule of thumb, "If you have to pay, stay away!" We have provided the best free resources on our scholarship webpage for you to utilize. If you have very complicated finances, you may want your personal financial planner to assist with the financial aid process. But those are not typical instances for most people.

Also, do not forget to complete the NYS TAP (Tuition Assistance Program) Grant financial aid application. The portal to apply is now open at https://www.hesc.ny.gov/pay-for-college/apply-for-financial-aid/apply-for-aid-start-here.html. TAP money is available for eligible New York State residents who plan to attend college within New York State.

The New York State Excelsior Grant is on hold at this time due to a lack of funding for it at the state government level.

On November 2, Mrs. Bean presented a detailed lesson on financial aid to all seniors in Economics class. This lesson is available on guidance webpage, in Microsoft Teams and in the Remind apron parents and seniors to reference.

Parents - Beware of Scholarship and Financial Aid "Scams"

In years past, several students and parents have called about information they have received in the mail or via phone calls regarding college scholarships and financial aid. Usually, the sales pitch starts something like this, "Do you know that over two million dollars in college scholarships went unclaimed last year? We can guarantee you a scholarship for college!" Oftentimes the e-mails or envelope and the letters look like they have been sent from an official agency with words like "national," "exclusive," and "education" in their title. I say, buyer beware!

Quite often the scholarships and the financial aid assistance these companies offer as part of their service are routinely available for free right here at school or on many websites. Furthermore, no one can promise you a scholarship because a legitimate scholarship is always competitive. Lastly, most financial aid that students receive for college will be generated from the FAFSA form or directly from the student's college.

My advice to parents is to exercise caution and call me before signing on to one of these "financial aid" businesses. A call or search online to the Better Business Bureau (703-276-0100) or the Attorney General (through the Consumer Protection Board –1-800-697-1220) is another way to verify a company's reputation. More than likely, high schools and colleges can do just as much for you as one of these companies – the only difference is that we don't charge a thing. We in the Guidance Office can provide you with excellent resources for doing high quality scholarship searches and have an abundance of information linked on the Guidance website under the scholarship page.

ASVAB CEP Career Exploration Program for Juniors

On Wednesday, November 30, interested juniors and seniors can take the ASVAB exam at 11:45 a.m. in the Lecture Hall, which will allow students to learn more about their academic strengths and weaknesses and how their aptitudes can affect their future career paths. The ASVAB can also be used as an entrance exam for enlisting in the military.

Then on Thursday, December 8, all interested students will participate in a career exploration lesson. The ASVAB presenter will interpret test results for students. Students will also complete the FYI (Find Your Interests) career interest inventory. This an excellent career exploration program, which is free to schools. We give the ASVAB on student school laptops, which allows them to proceed with testing at their own pace and be dismissed as soon as they are done testing. **STUDENTS CAN SIGN UP FOR ASVAB ELECTRONICALLY OR IN PERSON IN THE GUIDANCE OFFICE BY NOVEMBER 19**.

Parents of juniors, please be aware that the ASVAB test results will be released at the end of the school year to military recruiters because the ASVAB is the entrance exam used by military branches. If you do NOT want your child's scores released to the military, please notify us in the Guidance Office by November 18. However, please realize that the primary purpose of this program is for juniors to explore future career paths. This program's intention is not to lead students in any way shape or form necessarily toward a military career. These ASVAB scores however are active scores for students wishing to enlist in the future. If you have questions regarding this program, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs. Bean at 928-2985. A letter will be mailed home soon regarding the ASVAB.

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Winter Bus Stop Safety

It's that time of year again! With the approach of winter, we encourage parents to talk to their children about bus stop safety.

Danger Zone: This is that 15-foot area that surrounds the entire bus. Always try to keep 15 feet between you and the bus.

Pick-up procedures:

- Be out 10 minutes before pick-up time.
- Running to the bus is extremely dangerous.
- Dress for the weather.
- Only approach the bus after is comes to a complete stop. Remember 15 feet!
- Use handrails, as steps can be slippery.

Drop off procedures:

- No loose articles, drawstrings, papers, etc.
- Stay behind the white line until the door is open.
- Immediately proceed 15 feet from the bus. This is not the time to check the mail or grab the trash cans.
