# Elementary Physical Education Mrs. Auman and Mr. Pettit

Our annual Kids Heart Challenge is off to a great start! We are excited to partner with the American Heart Association to learn ways to lead a healthy lifestyle

and keep our hearts healthy. All students will be introduced to the life-saving skill of hands-only CPR.

Students in grades 3-5 have been learning about how to measure their heart rate and how participating in different exercises increases their heart rate. Younger students learned how their heart is a muscle and needs to be exercised to stay strong. In PE class, students participated in Cardio Fitness Stations, which included battle ropes, agility dots and ladder, punching bags, tire flips, medicine ball toss, planks, and jumping over a "wall."

Coming soon, all students will be jumping rope ninjas. They will be learning how to jump rope and will be challenged to level up by completing consecutive jumps and earning colored belts. Jumping rope is a great way to exercise your heart! We can't wait to see if any students make it to a black belt level.



## Message from the Superintendent

Dear Students, Parents, Faculty, Staff, and Members of the Bolivar-Richburg Community:

As I am sitting in my office overlooking the most northern mountains of the Appalachian Mountain region, it's hard to believe we still have six more weeks of winter. That is because we are experiencing a very unusual winter season, and we are in the second week of higher than normal temperatures, leaving the region to feel like we are having an early



spring. But it is also that time of year where we have reached the halfway point of a busy school year. As a District we continue to encourage our students to work hard and excel inside and outside of the classroom in sports, on the stage, and throughout our community. The Wolverine spirit is running high and as a community we have much to be proud of.

#### **School Budget Preparation**

I am working very closely with the Board of Education and the administrative team to develop the budget for 2023-2024 school year. The budget focuses on both balancing the academics and inter-scholastic sports, the fine arts, and after-school programs. In doing so we are looking at the long-range financial success of the Bolivar-Richburg CSD. During this budget development process our number one priority is to preserve a well-balanced educational experience for all of our students. Each year this task gets a little more difficult, but Bolivar-Richburg CS has talented and dedicated people. So, I'm confident we will be able to reach our goals, without impacting the local taxpayers.

#### Capital Project

As of this newsletter, we are still awaiting the New York State Education Department to complete the final review of our proposed Phase 2 of our 15.3 million-dollar, Capital Improvement Project. Phase 2 is scheduled to begin in late spring of 2023 and will hopefully be completed by December 2024. This Capital Improvement Project not only will address and maintain our infrastructure investments in our District buildings and property, but also will increase our educational offerings to all of our students moving forward. This new Capital Improvement Project touches upon several instructional areas and includes: new STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) and technology rooms and additions, renovations of the music and art suites, lighting and sound updates to both of our stages, classroom renovations to address additional storage and much needed special education support service spaces, sports locker rooms, parking lot re-paving district wide, boiler replacement, repairs and maintenance to the transportation garage, and additional safety and security improvements district wide.

### **School Safety and Security**

As a District, our number one priority is to provide our students, faculty, and staff a healthy and safe place to learn each and every day. In an effort to continue to improve on our current safety and security measures, we have enrolled for assistance with a nationally respected, school safety and security firm. This past fall we had an onsite safety and security inspection, which resulted in a list of further steps the District could take to better meet this goal in today's world. They are also working with the District administration and safety committee to conduct table-top training scenarios, and District-wide training/drills. Another part of our District safety plan includes our local School Resource Officer (SRO) through the joint efforts of the Bolivar-Richburg CSD and the Village of Bolivar PD. The SRO program provides daily police presence at all of our campus buildings, while building relationships between our students and local law enforcement.

#### Communication

We encourage you to be involved in your child's education and a big key to that success is communication. Good communication begins with talking directly to the person most closely related to the particular situation or concern. In many cases, that would be with your child's teacher or building principal. I encourage you to follow the chain of command as you work towards your answers, but as always my office door is always open.

In closing, I hope everyone enjoys the remaining days of winter as I am sure we all are looking forward to the warmer days of spring. Together we can continue to provide the best education possible for our children. It is an honor to serve this community, faculty, and staff, and most importantly, the children who you entrust to us every day.

# Qualifications for Membership on a School Board

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district; that is, a citizen of the United States; at least 18 years of age or older.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

# BRCS Petitions for Board of Education Seats

Petitions are available from the Superintendent's Office at the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District at 100 School Street, Bolivar, NY, 8:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. weekdays, or by emailing Connie Emery, District Clerk, at cemery@bolivarrichburg.org. Petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education must be filed with the Clerk of the District no later than 5:00 p.m. on or before April 17, 2023. Petitions will be filed for two full three-year expired terms and one unexpired term of one year.

- 2. Expired term of Jarrod Bell for three (3) years.
- 3. Unexpired term of Michelle Robinson for one (1) year.

Each petition must be signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters in the district and must state the name and residence of the candidate.

We have made it half-way through the school year and again, it has gone quickly! However, we don't want to rush the second half as we feel we still have so much we want to accomplish!

We look forward to seeing continued academic and emotional growth in each of our students. Our new intervention block has allowed every child to get instruction at their independent level in addition to the grade level instruction within the classroom. This program change has allowed teachers to fill in necessary gaps, making academic growth more achievable for all. Our new PBIS system, PAWS, continues to teach behavioral expectations across varied settings. It has been a joy to see teachers and students adopt this system. One thing that has impressed me most during this roll out is to see the selflessness students exhibit when purchasing from the weekly prize cart. Often times, students want to spend their red tickets on something they can share with their sibling(s) or to buy a "gift" for a family member's upcoming birthday or special occasion. So sweet!

Soon, students will be taking the NYS 3-8 ELA and Math Assessments (see dates and reminders below). We always want our students to strive to do their best on these assessments as they are another valuable tool that guides change to our instruction so that it is the best it can be for our students. As you may know, NYS has begun their rollout of Computer Based Testing (CBT). Our 4th grade students will be the first to take their NYS assessments on the computer this Spring. We recently completed a simulation with this grade level and the majority of students felt very comfortable with this platform.

As always, we appreciate your continued partnership with BRES! Please continue to communicate with your child's classroom teacher. We are here to support you and your child(ren) and open lines of communication help to develop stronger relationships between school and home.

### Kindergarten News


Miss Hackett, Mrs. Stutzman, and Mrs. Windus/Miss Steiner

### Miss Glover and Mrs. Mitchell

Greetings from the full day Pre-K classes! We have been super busy in full day Pre-K! The students have worked hard on writing their names as well as identifying their names. They are learning to identify their classmates' names. The students are working on learning the letters in their names by building, writing, and painting their names.

In December, students learned all about "Families and Communities." We had so much fun learning all about families and how they love us and help us grow and change! Students also learned about family traditions and celebrations, communities, and community helpers. Students had the opportunity to share with the class some of their family's holiday traditions. Thank you to all the families that helped with these projects—they were fantastic! Thank you to all of our families who made a gingerbread with their child at home and sent in for the hallway decorations! It was so nice to see all the different gingerbread while we learned the Classic Tale: "The Gingerbread Man."

In January and February, your child learned all about "Animals." The students learned the name of many animals, how animals' body parts help them survive, and animal baby names and their mothers. They even took a closer look at all of the animals they have learned about and sorted them into groups of animals, such as birds, insects, fish, and mammals. Students also worked on practicing telling stories,

learning nursery rhymes, rhyming, alphabet letters/sounds, drawing, and writing their names and even some animal names.

In math, students explored two- and three-dimensional shapes and objects. They learned to identify circles, triangles, squares, and rectangles. Students continue to work on counting up to 20, one-to-one correspondence, counting a set of objects to tell "how many" up to 10, and number recognition 6-10.



Second graders continue to work hard every day!

In reading, students have heard and learned about The War of 1812, Westward Expansion, and the Civil War. They have also read stories about kids who excel at various activities and about a brother and sister who are in search of a summer job in New York City. Second graders have been busy learning many new phonics sounds and spellings, including ey, the many sounds of y (short i, long i, long e), aw, augh, au, and igh. Students have been learning the difference between common and proper nouns along with verbs, including different tenses of the verb "to be" (was, is, were).

In math, students have been learning MANY different place value strategies to add and subtract two and three-digit numbers within 1,000. They also have been working very hard on solving one and TWO step word problems. Please continue to work on math facts within 20 at home, as this helps them be successful when using place value strategies to add and subtract.

# Fourth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Bentley

Fourth graders have been very busy! In Social Studies, we are learning about the thirteen colonies and the American Revolution. Students are learning about how the United States became the United States!

Also in Social Studies, we have completed landmark projects! The students were given the task, over ten weeks, to create any landmark/landform in New York state. In Science, we completed our animal and plant unit. We are moving into learning about different types of waves. We will do a lot of experiments with sound waves, light waves, and so much more! Also in science, Mr. Feuchter from BOCES came to snowshoe with us for the day! Each kid bundled up, tried on a pair of snowshoes, and trekked through the fields by the school. In the upcoming weeks,

we will be going to the Challenger Learning Center in Allegany, NY. We will work with electric circuits, explore space, and build contraptions! This last half of our year will be very busy, very hands-on, and very fun...and we are ready for it!

# Fifth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Hillman

Science and social studies have been filled with lots of exciting learning! In our science class, we have studied Earth's spheres and discovered how these spheres interact with one another with our science kit, "Models of Earth." We specifically looked at water distribution on our planet and came up with ways to sustain our water usage. We will soon be wrapping up this unit by completing an Engineering Design Challenge where the students are tasked with creating a water filter to produce clean and clear water. I can't wait to see their creative ideas!

In social studies, we have been busy learning about Ancient Civilizations such as the Maya, Aztec and the Inca. We discovered ways they were able to survive in difficult environments using different inventions. The 5th graders have been practicing writing and reading ancient Maya glyphs. Ask your child to show you some of the writing!

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# Fifth Grade ELA Mrs. Smith

ELA class has been filled with lots of reading and writing. We continue to read informational and literature-based texts. Our current module focuses on new or improved technologies that have been developed to meet societal needs and how those inventions have changed people's lives. Our writing focus has been responding to questions based on the articles or stories we are reading in class. Short responses are scored using a 2-point rubric. The extended response, which is an essay based on paired passages, requires an introduction, body paragraphs, and a conclusion. Essays are scored using a 4-point rubric. This is helping students prepare for the upcoming state tests which will be administered April 19-21.

Our "Wolverine PAWS" recipients certainly make us proud! Congratulations to Wyatt Pastor and Zachery Carman. To be selected, students must go above and beyond to help others and show good character traits.

Please continue to support your child at home each night by checking their agenda, red folder for homework assignments/important notes, and making sure their iPad is charged. All 5th graders are required to read at least 25 minutes every night, which should total 500+ minutes per month as part of the school wide reading program. Remember, reading is knowledge!

### Elementary Guidance News Mrs. Angela Schryver

Spring testing is just around the corner! We are working hard to prepare our students as much as possible. State testing often brings angst for both parents and children. All parents want to see their children perform well in school. Parents play an important part in helping their children give their best performance on a test. The tips presented below may serve as a guideline for parents when helping their

children prepare for testing.

During the weeks leading up to the test, begin to talk with your child about the importance of giving their best effort during testing. Practice with them, talk to their teachers to find out what areas they need more practice in, and most importantly READ with your child. Good reading skills will help your child with reading passages and will help them feel more confident. The following are tips to help you in preparing your child to do their best.

#### The night before:

- Help your child get to bed on time. Research shows that being well-rested helps students do better.
- Help children resolve immediate arguments before going to bed.
- Keep your routine as normal as possible. Upsetting natural routines may make children feel insecure.
- Mention the test to show you're interested, but don't dwell on it.
- Plan ahead to avoid conflicts on the morning of the test.

#### The morning of the test:

- Get up early to avoid rushing. Be sure to have your child at school on time.
- Have your child eat a good breakfast but not a heavy one. Research shows that students do better if they have breakfast before they take tests.
- Be positive about the test. Acknowledge that tests can be hard and that they're designed so that no one will know all of the answers. Explain that doing your best is what counts. The important thing is to make your child comfortable and confident about the test.

After the test, talk with your child about how it went. Praise them for doing their best, and reassure them that you are proud of them for giving their best effort.

## Middle/High School News

As we inch slowly towards Spring, and we look forward to the new life that the changing seasons bring, we continue our progress here at BRCS. I want you to know that there is a growing movement of positive change. With the decreased presence of cell phones, and the implementation of vape detectors in our bathrooms, we have seen a significant drop in discipline. To be exact, we have cut our referrals almost in half from last year's total. This is a testament to the resiliency of our students and the support that we receive from our parents and community members.

I would love to see this pocket of positivity grow and thrive. I have had parents ask me, "How can I help?" If you truly want to be a part of this movement, here are five great ideas:

- 1. Focus on your happiness! Studies have shown that happy kids come from being around happy adults. Take some time for yourself during the week. Focus on your physical and mental health. By doing so, you will have more positive energy for your kids. Try to take a night off of technology, play some games with your kids, and JUST HAVE FUN!
- 2. Teach them how to handle conflict and build positive relationships. You're tired and the kids are being loud. You look up from your phone and yell, "Knock it off!" Does it work? Do they magically quiet down and behave? Probably not. Yelling breeds more yelling. Instead, try something new. Take some time to explain why you're asking them to keep it down. Give them small tasks to help build positive habits. Simple things like helping with dinner, cleaning their rooms, or taking the dogs out. Praise them for their help and try to teach them empathy by listening to them as they talk about their day.
- **3. Be positive and teach optimism!** Is your teenager defiant, angry, full of anxiety, battling depression? Try to help them reframe. As the famous adage states, "Life is 5% what happens to us, and 95% how we choose to handle it." Reframing helps to change the narrative we feed ourselves. Instead of "Ugh, today is going to be terrible...I have a test 1st period," help your son or daughter understand that this is an opportunity to see what they know, and what they need help with moving forward. Better yet, the test is first thing in the morning, so you have the rest of the day to enjoy your friends at school!
- **4. Expect effort, not perfection.** This one goes out to all helicopter parents—praise the effort, not the achievement. We see this in both sports and academics. Students who are consistently praised and applauded for their intelligence or natural talent quit taking risks and have a greater chance of developing into a perfectionist. Conversely, if you highlight and praise the EFFORT, students understand that failure is a part of the process, and realize that calculated risk-taking is beneficial to growth and critical thinking.
- 5. Create a child who takes ownership of their actions. We know that the human brain doesn't fully mature until 25 or 26-years-old. This inevitably leads to many poor decisions, mistakes, and "getting into trouble," each of which are normal parts of life as a teenager. A night of detention, or a day in ISS is not a life sentence. It is a learning experience. Part of that lesson is to take ownership for your actions, and learn from your mistakes. This process does not take place if you are not truthful. If you lie, or try to "cover" for yourself or a friend, you are creating habits of being dishonest. Similarly, if you as the parent are convinced that your child isn't in the wrong, or the school is "out to get them," your child loses that opportunity to take ownership and learn from their mistakes.

My continued hope is to work together as a district and a community to do what is best for our students. This is an endeavor that has no end and will take extreme commitment and hard work. ### TIPS AND TASKS FOR PARENTS AND STUDENTS THAT WILL HELP YOU STAY ON TOP OF ACADEMIC PROGRESS


These basic tasks will assist you in staying current and up to date regarding your student's grades, attendance, homework assignments, deadlines, etc.

- <u>Utilize the parent portal every day to monitor your child's homework completion, attendance and grades.</u> The Guidance Office is glad to help set up accounts, reset passwords, etc. with the portal, which is a helpful tool. You can even add it as a mobile device phone app and it is then at your fingertips to check! BRCS's PowerSchool app code is CRKT.
- Ask your child to share with you their Microsoft Teams log in or sign in together (user name and password) so that you can view what assignments and messages they have inside of Teams. This is where teachers may be linking students' work electronically. Teams does not currently have a parent/guardian view-only option for their software platform unfortunately.
- Make sure your child has turned on the notifications for every Microsoft Team they are a member of to receive immediate notification messages so that they are aware when staff are sending out not only assignments, but other important messages. IF NOTIFICATIONS ARE OFF, YOUR CHILD IS PROBABLY MISSING OUT ON A GREAT AMOUNT OF IMPORTANT AND HELPFUL INFORMATION.
- Contact your child's teachers and counselors if you need assistance.
- Help your child have a <u>quiet</u>, <u>distraction-free</u> <u>learning space</u>, <u>time and routine</u> at home as often as it is possible.
- Assist your child in creating a school daily calendar whether it be on paper, in a school agenda or an electronic calendar platform or app for their important deadlines.

# SAT and ACT Update for College-Bound Sophomores & Juniors

Due to the pandemic, many SAT and ACT test opportunities were canceled or restricted for health safety reasons. Currently, 84% of colleges have gone "test optional" for the current senior class. Test optional means you MAY submit an SAT or ACT score if you have one, but that it is <u>not</u> required in order to apply.

We have given the practice Pre-SAT already this year to any interested sophomores and juniors free of charge that wish to familiarize themselves with the test time limits and style of questions. This spring, a practice Pre-ACT exam will be given to any interested sophomores or juniors free of charge. Sign up in the Guidance Office! It is recommended to check colleges of interest websites to see if SATs/ACTs are required to apply or not. SUNY public colleges are test optional for current seniors, but it has not yet been announced if current juniors will or will not be required to submit these test scores with their college applications.

Students should register for these tests online at <a href="www.actstudent.org">www.actstudent.org</a> for the ACT and <a href="www.sat.collegeboard.org/register">www.sat.collegeboard.org/register</a> for the SAT. I am glad to assist if students run into technical problems while trying to complete their registrations. <a href="If a student normally qualifies">If a student normally qualifies</a> for free or reduced lunch or receives government financial assistance, I may be able to give them a fee waiver, which waives the fees to take the SAT and the ACT exam twice during their junior or senior year. Students need to request fee waivers in person at the Guidance Office.</a> STUDENTS MAY TEST AS MANY TIMES AS THEY WOULD LIKE AND COLLEGES WILL OFTEN CONSIDER THE HIGHEST SUBTEST SCORES.

# Financial Aid Reminders for Seniors

Seniors have been reminded to be sure that they have filed the correct financial aid applications for the colleges to which they have applied—mainly the FAFSA and TAP applications. In addition to all colleges requiring the FAFSA, some colleges have their own application or use the CSS Profile and, more importantly, their very own filing deadlines. Students should call their college financial aid department or check the website to verify forms and deadlines. 
