Hello, BRES Families!

As we approach the end of the calendar year, we typically take time to reflect on all that we've accomplished this year and set resolutions for the future.

During this calendar year, we rolled out some changes at BRES that have positively impacted our students and their school day.

- The intervention block that we created during the 2022-23 school year is still working wonders for our students. This time allows teachers to meet with small groups of students, addressing academic and behavioral deficits they wouldn't be able to do during whole-group instruction.
- We've continued our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) system. With it being year two, the expectations and common language have become a part of our everyday culture. Students are frequently being praised and rewarded for their good behavior!
- New This Year! In hopes of further improving our phonics instruction at grades K-3, we adopted a new research based program called "From Phonics to Reading" by Blevins. With this program, we hope to close some academic gaps found within our current curriculum.
- New This Year! We've adopted a new Social-Emotional curriculum called "Wayfinder." These brief lessons teach students how to regulate their own emotions, show empathy towards others, and to be an active member in their class community.

With these changes, we continue to be pleased with our improvements at BRES. Recently, our NYS 3-8 test data results were released to us. In five out of our six assessment areas, we improved our school's ranking within the CA BOCES region again! Teachers and students put in hard work each and every day and we are excited to see that hard work be recognized.

We had a great start to the school year in full day pre-k! In September, we did a lot of name activities as well as "getting to know" each other activities. It was so much fun getting to know all the students. Our first reading unit was about the five senses and all about me. The students learned about naming the five senses as well as the corresponding body part. The students had so much fun painting and creating life sized cut outs of themselves! This month, the students learned all about "Families and Communities." We had so much fun learning all about families and how they love us and help us grow and change! Students also learned about family traditions and celebrations, communities, and community helpers. In the next couple of months, we will be working on Classic Tales such as "The Lion and the Mouse," "The Elves and the Shoemaker," and "The Gingerbread Man." In math we have been working on numbers 1-5, sorting objects by color, shape, size, and we have been identifying groups that are the same and different. Thank you, Mr. Mitchell, for talking to our classes about construction and road work! The students loved being able to see and watch the new road behind the school.

In kindergarten, we have been having a lot of fun learning. We have been getting to know each other and playing with friends. We've been making fall crafts and doing fun fall activities. We heard some of our favorite stories and learned about characters, setting, and plots. Then we learned all about our five senses. We enjoyed investigating the world around us using our senses. First Grade

Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Ordway, Miss Gerard, and Miss Johnston

Happy fall! First graders have had a busy start to the year!

In Math, they have been learning more about how addition and subtraction are related and how to write correct number sentences. They also learned about the value of the equal sign and how to balance equations! (ex. 5 + 1 = 4 + 2)

In Reading, they have been reviewing all their letters and sounds and learning new tricky words. Tricky words are words that have parts in them that do not follow the rules, so we have to learn that part by heart. They have been working hard at breaking words up by their sounds and then blending them back together to say the word. They have also heard many fables and learned what a moral or lesson is. In addition, students

have been busy learning about different body systems such as the circulatory, skeletal, nervous, digestive, and muscular systems. They have learned the importance of eating healthy and washing their

hands!

Lastly, students got to investigate apples. They learned about the life cycle of an apple tree, tasted foods made with apples, weighed and measured apples, made applesauce, and tasted 3 different kinds of apples.

We are looking forward to more fun and learning in first grade!



We have really hit the ground running in third grade! In math we have quickly learned strategies to multiply and divide. We've been able to tell time on a number line and round to the nearest ten and hundred. In ELA we are learning all about cultures around the world and some great strategies to use when reading any type of text.

Fourth Grade ELA Mrs. Bell

Fourth Graders have been busy in ELA! We've already completed our first module about Native Americans and moved on to Module 2, Colonial America. They've been working hard on many comprehension skills and writing. We have already completed a couple writing projects. They also spent some time working on symbolism in past cultures. Students made their own Wampum Belts that showed symbols about things important to them in their lives. They also made a quilt square to make a large classroom quilt. Then they wrote about their symbolism, and how it contributes to our class community. On Halloween, students went down and spent time reading with the younger grades. They really enjoyed this! Both younger students and 4th graders enjoyed this experience.















Fourth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Bentley

Boy, have we been busy in Science and Social Studies! In Social Studies, we have been learning about Native Americans. We made masks, dreamcatchers, longhouses, animal hide carvings, and created mosaics from the three sisters (ask your child what those are). Our next unit will focus on Europeans coming to North America to set up the 13 colonies. In Science, we are just about finished with our Earth Process unit. We made the rock cycle out of Starbursts and learned about weathering, erosion, and deposition through a Skittles lab. We have been doing a lot of hands-on activities to really understand what changes our earth goes through. It has been a lot of work, but a lot of fun too. Next, in Science, we will be focusing on the structure and functions of plants and animals...which is where we get the live crayfish sent to the room. I cannot wait to keep exploring with these 4th graders!

Fifth Grade Science & Social Studies Mrs. Hillman

We have had a busy, productive, and fun start to this school year. 5th graders have been hard at work in science learning about matter with our science unit, "Chemistry in the Kitchen." We have conducted many exciting experiments to find evidence to prove matter is made of particles too small to be seen. We will soon be exploring if mixing two or more substances will result in a new substance. Ask your child to share with you some of the experiments we have done in class!

In social studies, we have been flying through our geography unit. We started by identifying the continents of the world and then the Western Hemisphere. The students all worked hard to conduct research and present to the class information about a country in the Western Hemisphere. These projects turned out amazing! We continued to explore different cultures by learning about Day of the Day with a virtual field trip from the Quick Arts Center. The students are hard at work designing their own ofrendas. Ask your child to share with your different elements of an ofrenda.

Fifth Grade ELA Mrs. Smith

ELA class has been filled with lots of reading and writing! Our guided reading groups are running smoothly, as we focus on fiction and nonfiction texts. We have been reading the novel Esperanza Rising by Pam Munoz Ryan. Set in the early 1930s, twenty years after the Mexican Revolution and during the Great Depression, Esperanza Rising tells the story of a young Mexican girl's courage and resourcefulness when at the age of thirteen she finds herself living in a strange new world. Esperanza, whose name means "hope" in Spanish, must rise again, into a resourceful and responsible young woman. My hope is that this



novel teaches us the value of human rights, to persevere when faced with obstacles, and to treat others with dignity and respect!

Tips For Parents to Help Stay on Top of Your Child's Schooling

These basic tasks will assist you in staying current and up to date regarding your student's grades, attendance, homework assignments, deadlines, social-emotional state, and information sent out to students from teachers, counselors and other staff.

- <u>Utilize the parent portal every day to monitor your child's homework completion, attendance, and grades.</u> The Guidance Office is glad to help set up accounts, reset passwords, etc. with the portal, which is a helpful tool. You can even add it as a mobile device phone app and it is then at your fingertips to check! You can email teachers directly through the portal.
- Ask your child to share with you their Microsoft Teams login (username and password) so that you can view what assignments and messages they have inside of Teams. This is where teachers may link students' work electronically. Teams does not currently have a parent/guardian view-only option for their software platform, unfortunately.
- Make sure your child has turned on the notifications for every Microsoft Team they are a member of to receive immediate notification messages so that they are aware when staff are sending out not only assignments but other important messages. IF NOTIFICATIONS ARE OFF, YOUR CHILD IS PROBABLY MISSING OUT ON A GREAT AMOUNT OF IMPORTANT AND HELPFUL INFORMATION.
- Monitor your child's use of the Teams Chat feature to make sure they are utilizing it respectfully and responsibly.
- Contact your child's teachers and counselors if you need assistance.
- Help your child have a quiet, distraction-free learning space at home as much as it is possible.
- Assist your child in creating a daily school calendar with their paper planners or electronically in Teams
- "ROSES AND THORNS" DAILY CHECK-IN: Every day, check in and ask your child how their day was. What was the "rose" or best part of the day? What was the low point or "thorn" of their day? As counselors, we are currently flooded with students coming in needing to speak about stressors, anxiety, and depression this year. Family members taking some time each day to check in with your child about their day is a critical support that all students need. Do not assume that your child is coping well if they are quiet. Please talk openly and often about their school days.

January Regents exams will be given throughout the state on January 23-26, 2024. For those seeking to retake a Regents examination to either achieve a passing score or enhance their previous results, parents and guardians can contact the Guidance Office at 928-2986. Students can also contact Mrs. Crandall-Bean to ensure their name is added to the test roster. There is no charge for a student to retake a regents exam in January. Please note that New York State regulations do not allow students to be admitted to a morning exam after 10:00 a.m. or to an afternoon exam after 2:00 p.m. In addition, no student may leave an exam before those same times. This regulation is in place to prevent students from sharing information about an exam.





3rd Annual "SNACKS AND APPS DAY" For Seniors

On October 7, interested seniors attended the Second Annual "Snacks and Apps Day" in the lecture hall. Staff Sergeant Frietas, our Army recruiter, presented on military enlistment; Susan Day from the Allegany County Employment and Training Center in Belmont presented on finding jobs; and Alfred State College's Assistant Director, John Lewis, presented on how to select and apply to colleges. Students were treated to snacks while they worked on college applications and resumes, wrote college essays. and explored college websites.







PowerSchool Parent Portal

Parents of 6-12th grade students who have not yet set up a PowerSchool parent portal account or who need assistance resetting their current accounts, please feel free to contact



your child's counselor at 928-2406 (Mrs. Robinson, grades 6-9) or 928-2985 (Mrs. Crandall-Bean, grades 10-12) to obtain directions along with your child's portal codes. The portal allows you to view online, 24-7, your child's current grades, attendance, and lunch account balances. Parents have the ability to add all of their students to one single portal account. Students are all given their own student account when they begin grade 6 and are encouraged to self-monitor their own academic progress. Our goal this year is to have 100% of our 6-12 students and parents using portal accounts. We hope you will take advantage of this great tool that can be very helpful to stay up to date on grades, attendance, and homework assignments. By clicking on a teacher's name in blue print in the portal, parents can email teachers questions that they may have.

There is also a PowerSchool phone app that parents and students can use. The free app can be obtained through the App Store or the Google Play store. **The BRCS school code is CRKT.** Many students and parents use the portal phone app to stay on top of their academic information, as it is a wonderful communication tool!

Alfred State College Campus Visit For Juniors and Seniors

On November 2, thirty four juniors and seniors visited Alfred State College. They sat through an admissions overview providing them basic information about applying and selecting colleges, toured campus, and ate lunch in the leadership building. Several students spent the day on the Wellsville campus shadowing in their classrooms of interest such as automotive technology, carpentry, and heavy equipment operations. Alfred State offers numerous degrees and programs and is close enough for our B-R students to commute to and from and obtain a quality education at an affordable price. 77% of Alfred State's current students qualify for the Excelsior Scholarship and obtain free tuition!

PSAT, ACT, and SAT Testing

We gave the first-ever digital PSAT practice exam for interested sophomores and juniors on October 24. College-bound juniors are encouraged to consider taking the SAT and/or the ACT in the spring. Seniors are encouraged to take one of these exams this fall. Many counselors feel the ACT is a fairer exam for many students as it is based on student achievement. Colleges accept ACT scores equal to SAT scores. Registration documents for both tests are available in the Guidance Office and on the Guidance website to assist students with the online registration process. Registering online is relatively simple and convenient and will allow students to receive their test scores quickly. Students with financial needs that would normally qualify for free or reduced lunch can be given two fee waivers for junior and senior year for both tests to cover the testing fees. These can be requested in the Guidance Office and are limited in the number available.

<u>Test optional – What does that mean?</u> Due to COVID's indoor large-group gathering restrictions, many SAT and ACT exams were canceled or limited in test seats. Therefore, 84% of colleges have remained "test-optional," meaning that no SAT or ACT is required for college applications to their institutions. To be safe, it does not hurt to check college websites for their specific testing requirement and take at least one SAT or ACT exam in case it is needed in the future for college acceptance and scholarship contests.



College Reps, Fairs, and Visits

This year we were able to hold our annual ACCA College Fair at Houghton University on September 26. BR Juniors and seniors were able to speak with around 50 college representatives.

The Guidance Office is hosting many individual college reps in person in our office and some also virtually this fall. The list is available in Teams and on our Guidance webpage for students and parents and is shared during morning announcements. Mrs. Crandall-Bean is glad to help students with college exploration applications and setting up in-person and virtual visits.

Seniors Make Future Plans

I have met with all seniors individually to review transcripts and make corrections if needed, determine what specific courses and regents exams still need to be passed for graduation, discuss post-high school plans, and map out the tasks they need to complete for their college, military and career plans. Each student was given an individualized folder of tasks to complete for their specific post-secondary career, military, or college plan. Those students who are interested in college may have been given handouts about selecting and applying to colleges. It is highly recommended that seniors try to complete their college application(s) by the end of Thanksgiving recess. Students are welcome to have their applications proofread in the Guidance Office prior to submitting them. Also, since most students are now applying online, it is vitally important that they let me or my secretary know each time they apply so that we mail or upload the student's official transcript. Colleges require an official transcript of high school grades and will not process a student's college application until they have received one

The "Senior Fall To-Do List," "Basics of Financial Aid," and "Scholarship Searches" presentations can be found electronically on the high school guidance website and will be pushed out to students in grades 11 & 12 in Microsoft Teams labeled "Guidance Info for Junior and Seniors."



Important Financial Aid Information

In the past, the FAFSA application portal (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) opened on October 1. This portal is how students qualify for free federal grant money and federal student loans. However, this year the FAFSA application has been completely overhauled and shortened from 100 to 36 questions. We as college and high school counselors are anxiously awaiting the details of the "NEW FAFSA." The December/January launch date has not yet been released.

As soon as the changes are finalized, we will present this important info to students and parents. Please watch for upcoming winter lessons and presentations on financial aid applications and scholarship searches.

Two of the best resources for parents to find more information on the financial aid process are the Higher Education Services Corporation (HESC) website: www.hesc.org and Federal Student Aid at www.finaid.org. These two sites are loaded with information for parents and are two of the very best and easiest to navigate. These sites are not just for parents of seniors but also for parents of any students who are considering college.

Parents (or students) should not feel the need to pay for help with a financial aid form or for scholarship searches. Oftentimes the services that advertise to help you with these are frauds or, at the very least, a rip-off. They often promise students thousands of dollars in financial aid. The rule of thumb is, "If you have to pay, stay away!" We have provided the best free resources on our scholarship webpage for you to utilize. If you have very complicated finances, you may want your personal financial planner to assist with the financial aid process. But those are not typical instances for most people.

Also, do not forget to complete the NYS TAP (Tuition Assistance Program) Grant financial aid application online. The HESC portal to apply is now open at https://www.hesc.ny.gov/pay-for-college/apply-for-financial-aid/apply-for-aid-start-here.html. TAP money is available for eligible New York State residents who plan to attend college within New York State.

The New York State Excelsior Grant, which covers SUNY tuition costs for families earning less than \$125,000 per year will have its application released next spring.

Parents - Beware of Scholarship and Financial Aid "Scams"

In years past several students and parents have called about information they have received in the mail or phone calls they have received regarding college scholarships and financial aid. Usually, the sales pitch starts something like this, "Do you know that over two million dollars in college scholarships went unclaimed last year? We can guarantee you a scholarship for college!" Often times the e-mails or envelopes and the letters look like they have been sent from an official agency with words like "national," "exclusive," and "education" in their title. I say, buyer beware!

Quite often the scholarships and the financial aid assistance these companies offer as part of their service are routinely available for <u>free</u> right here at school or on many websites. Furthermore, no one can <u>promise</u> you a scholarship because a legitimate scholarship is <u>always</u> competitive. Lastly, most financial aid that students receive for college will be generated from the FAFSA form or directly from the student's college.

My advice to parents is to exercise caution and call me before signing on to one of these "financial aid" businesses. A call or search online to the Better Business Bureau (703-276-0100) or the Attorney General (through the Consumer Protection Board, 1-800-697-1220 is another way to verify a company's reputation. More than likely, high schools and colleges can do just as much for you as one of these companies—the only difference is that we don't charge a thing. We in the Guidance Office can provide you with excellent resources for doing high-quality scholarship searches and have an abundance of information linked on the Guidance website on the scholarship page.

ASVAB CEP Career Exploration Program for Juniors

On Monday, November 27, interested juniors and seniors can take the ASVAB exam at 11:45 a.m. in the Lecture Hall, which will allow students to learn more about their academic strengths and weaknesses and how their aptitudes can affect their future career paths. The ASVAB can also be used as an entrance exam for enlisting in the military.

On Thursday, December 7, all interested students will participate in a career exploration lesson. The ASVAB presenter will interpret test results for students. Students will also complete the FYI (Find Your Interests) career interest inventory. This is an excellent career exploration program, which is free to schools.

We give the ASVAB on school laptops, which allows students to proceed with testing at their own pace and be dismissed as soon as they are done testing.

Parents of juniors, please be aware that the **ASVAB test results will be released** at the end of the school year to military recruiters because the ASVAB is the entrance exam used by military branches. Please realize that the primary purpose of this program is for juniors to explore future career paths. This program's intention is not to lead students in any way shape or form necessarily toward a military career. These ASVAB scores, however, are active scores for students wishing to enlist in the future. If you have questions regarding this program, please do not hesitate to contact Mrs. Bean at 928-2985.



High School Art


