### Wellness Policies on Physical Activity and Nutrition

## **Purpose and Goal:**

The link between nutrition and learning is well documented. Healthy eating patterns are essential for students to achieve their full academic potential, full physical and mental growth, and lifelong health and wellbeing. Healthy eating is demonstrably linked to reduced risk for mortality and development of many chronic diseases as adults. BRCS has a responsibility to help students and staff, establish and maintain lifelong, healthy eating patterns. Well-planned and well-implemented school nutrition programs have been shown to positively influence students' eating habits.

All students shall possess the knowledge and skills necessary to make nutritious and enjoyable food choices for a lifetime. In addition, all staff members are encouraged to model healthy eating and physical activity as a valuable part of daily life. The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District shall prepare, adopt, and implement a comprehensive plan to encourage healthy eating and physical activity. This plan shall make effective use of school and community resources and equitably serve the needs and interests of all students and staff.

### I. School Health Councils

The school district Wellness Committee will work to develop, implement, monitor, review, and, as necessary, revise school nutrition and physical activity policies. The committee also will serve as a resource to school sites for implementing those policies.

# II. Nutritional Quality of Foods and Beverages Sold and Served on Campus

#### School Meals

Meals served through the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs will:

- be appealing and attractive to children;
- be served in clean and pleasant settings;
- meet, at a minimum, nutrition requirements established by local, state, and federal statutes and regulations;
- · offer a variety of fruits and vegetables;
- serve only low-fat (1%) and fat-free milk and nutritionally-equivalent non-dairy alternatives (to be defined by USDA); and
- ensure that at least 51% of the served grains are whole grain.

**Breakfast.** To ensure that all children have breakfast, either at home or at school, in order to meet their nutritional needs and enhance their ability to learn:

- BRCS will, to the extent possible, operate the School Breakfast Program.
- BRCS will, to the extent possible, arrange bus schedules and utilize methods to serve school breakfasts that encourage participation, this may include serving breakfast in the classroom, "grab-and-go" breakfast, or breakfast during morning break or recess.
- BRCS that serve breakfast to students will notify parents and students of the availability of the School Breakfast Program.
- BRCS will encourage parents to provide a healthy breakfast for their children through newsletter articles, take-home materials, or other means.

Meals at no charge through CEP (Community Eligibility Provision). BRCS will make every effort to eliminate any social stigma attached to, and prevent the overt identification of, students who are eligible for free school meals. Toward this end, BRCS will utilize electronic identification and

payment systems; provide meals at no charge to all children, regardless of income; promote the availability of school meals to all students; and/or use nontraditional methods for serving school meals, such as "grab-and-go" or classroom breakfast.

**Summer Food Service Program.** BRCS Schools in which more than 50% of students are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals will sponsor the Summer Food Service Program for at least four weeks between the last day of the academic school year and the first day of the following school year, and preferably throughout the entire summer vacation.

#### **Meal Times and Scheduling.** Schools:

- will provide students with at least 10 minutes to eat after sitting down for breakfast and 15 minutes after sitting down for lunch;
- will schedule meal periods at appropriate times, e.g., lunch should be scheduled between 10:00 a.m. and 1:15 p.m.;
- will not schedule tutoring, club, or organizational meetings or activities during mealtimes, unless students may eat during such activities;
- will schedule lunch periods to follow recess periods (in elementary schools);
- will provide students access to hand washing or hand sanitizing before they eat meals or snacks; and
- will take reasonable steps to promote the tooth-brushing regimens of students with special oral health needs (e.g., orthodontia or high tooth decay risk).

**Qualifications of School Food Service Staff.** Qualified nutrition professionals will administer the school meal programs. As part of the school district's responsibility to operate a food service program, we will provide continuing professional development for all nutrition professionals in schools. Staff development programs should include appropriate certification and/or training programs for child nutrition directors, school nutrition managers, and cafeteria workers, according to their levels of responsibility.

**Sharing of Foods and Beverages.** BRCS should discourage students from sharing their foods or beverages with one another during meal or snack times, given concerns about allergies and other restrictions on some children's diets.

Foods and Beverages Sold Individually (*i.e.*, foods sold outside of reimbursable school meals, such as through vending machines, cafeteria a la carte [snack] lines, fundraisers, school stores, etc.)

**Elementary Schools.** The school food service program will approve and provide all food and beverage sales to students in the BRCS elementary school. Given young children's limited nutrition skills, food in the BRCS elementary school should be sold as balanced meals. If available, foods and beverages sold individually should include low-fat and non-fat milk, fruits, and non-fried vegetables.

Middle/Junior High and High Schools. In the BRCS middle/junior high and high school, all foods and beverages sold individually outside the reimbursable school meal programs (including those sold through a la carte [snack] lines, vending machines, or student stores) during the school day, or through programs for students after/before the school day, will meet the following nutrition and portion size standards:

#### Beverages

- Allowed: water or seltzer water without added caloric sweeteners; fruit and vegetable juices and fruit-based drinks that contain at least 100% fruit juice and that do not contain additional caloric sweeteners; unflavored or flavored low-fat or fat-free fluid milk and nutritionally-equivalent nondairy beverages (to be defined by USDA); sports drinks
- Not allowed: soft drinks containing caloric sweeteners; iced teas; fruit-based drinks that contain less than 100% real fruit juice or that contain additional caloric sweeteners; beverages containing caffeine, excluding low-fat or fat-free chocolate milk (which contain trivial amounts of caffeine).

#### Foods

- · A food item sold individually:
  - Will either
    - be a grain product that contains 50% or more whole

- grains by weight (have a whole grain as the first ingredient), or
- have as the first ingredient a fruit, vegetable, dairy product or protein food.
- •be 200 calories or less
- will have no more than 35% of its calories from fat (excluding nuts, seeds, peanut butter, and other nut butters) and 10% of its calories from saturated and trans fat combined;
- will have no more than 35% of its weight from added sugars;
- will contain no more than 200 mg of sodium per serving for snack items or 480 calories or less for entrée items.
- A choice of at least two fruits and/or non-fried vegetables will be offered for sale at any location on the school site where foods are sold. Such items could include, but are not limited to, fresh fruits and vegetables; 100% fruit or vegetable juice; fruit-based drinks that are at least 100% fruit juice and that do not contain additional caloric sweeteners; cooked, dried, or canned fruits (canned in fruit juice or light syrup); and cooked, dried, or canned vegetables (that meet the above fat and sodium guidelines).

#### Portion Sizes

- Limit portion sizes of foods and beverages sold individually to those listed below:
  - •One and one-quarter ounces for chips, crackers, popcorn, cereal, trail mix, nuts, seeds, dried fruit, or jerky;
  - One ounce for cookies;
  - Two ounces for cereal bars, granola bars, pastries, muffins, doughnuts, bagels, and other bakery items;
  - Four fluid ounces for frozen desserts, including, but not limited to, low-fat or fat-free ice cream;
  - Eight ounces for non-frozen yogurt;
  - •Twelve fluid ounces for beverages, excluding water; and
  - •The portion size of a la carte entrees and side dishes, including potatoes, will not be greater than the size of comparable portions offered as part of school meals.

Fruits and non-fried vegetables are exempt from portionsize limits.

#### **Fundraising Activities.**

- All fundraising projects are encouraged to follow the District Nutrition Standards.
- All fundraising projects for sale and consumption within and prior to the instructional day will be expected to make every effort to follow the District's Nutrition Standards when determining the items being sold.
  - Items being sold that do not meet the District Nutrition Standards may be acceptable for student consumption within moderation (i.e. limit quantity sold to an individual student)
  - Items being sold that do not meet the District Nutrition Standards may be acceptable when offered on an intermittent basis.

**Snacks.** Snacks served during the school day or in after-school care or enrichment programs will make a positive contribution to children's diets and health, with an emphasis on serving fruits and vegetables as the primary snacks and water as the primary beverage. BRCS will assess if and when to offer snacks based on timing of school meals, children's nutritional needs, children's ages, and other considerations. The district will disseminate a list of healthful snack items to teachers, after-school program personnel, and parents.

• If eligible, schools that provide snacks through after-school programs will pursue receiving reimbursements through the National School Lunch Program.

**Teacher to Student Incentive.** Strong consideration should be given to nonfood items as part of any teacher-to student incentive programs. Should teachers feel compelled to utilize food items as an incentive, they are encouraged to adhere to the District Nutrition Standards.

School-sponsored Events (such as, but not limited to, athletic events, dances, or performances). Foods and beverages offered or sold at school-sponsored events outside the school day must offer healthy

choices.

# III. Nutrition and Physical Activity Promotion and Food Marketing

**Nutrition Education and Promotion.** Bolivar-Richburg Central School District aims to teach, encourage, and support healthy eating by students. Schools should provide nutrition education and engage in nutrition promotion that:

- is offered at each grade level as part of a sequential, comprehensive, standards-based program designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills necessary to promote and protect their health;
- is part of not only health education classes, but also classroom instruction in subjects such as math, science, language arts, social sciences, and elective subjects;
- includes enjoyable, developmentally-appropriate, culturally-relevant, participatory activities, such as contests, promotions, taste testing, farm visits, and school gardens;
- promotes fruits, vegetables, whole grain products, low-fat and fat-free dairy products, healthy food preparation methods, and healthenhancing nutrition practices;
- emphasizes caloric balance between food intake and energy expenditure (physical activity/exercise);
- links with school meal programs, other school foods, and nutritionrelated community services;
- teaches media literacy with an emphasis on food marketing; and
- includes training for teachers and other staff.

**Integrating Physical Activity into the Classroom Setting.** For students to receive the nationally-recommended amount of daily physical activity and for students to fully embrace regular physical activity as a personal behavior, students need opportunities for physical activity beyond physical education class. Toward that end:

 Classroom health education will complement physical education by reinforcing the knowledge and self-management skills needed to

- maintain a physically-active lifestyle and to reduce time spent on sedentary activities, such as watching television.
- Opportunities for physical activity will be incorporated into other subject lessons.
- Classroom teachers will provide short physical activity breaks between lessons or classes, as appropriate.
- Teacher/staff development will be provided on how to incorporate physical activities into lessons.

**Communications with Parents.** Bolivar-Richburg Central School will support parents' efforts to provide a healthy diet and daily physical activity for their children. BRCS will offer healthy eating seminars for parents, send home nutrition information, post nutrition tips on school websites, and provide nutrient analyses of school menus. Schools should encourage parents to pack healthy lunches and snacks and to refrain from including beverages and foods that do not meet the above nutrition standards for individual foods and beverages.

BRCS will provide information about physical education and other school-based physical activity opportunities before, during, and after the school day; and support parents' efforts to provide their children with opportunities to be physically active outside of school. Such supports will include sharing information about physical activity and physical education through a website, newsletter, or other take-home materials, special events, or physical education homework.

**Staff Wellness.** Bolivar-Richburg Central School District highly values the health and well-being of every staff member and will plan and implement activities and policies that support personal efforts by staff to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

## IV. Physical Activity Opportunities and Physical Education

**Daily Physical Education (P.E.) K-12** All physical education will be taught by a physical education teacher. Student involvement in other activities involving physical activity (*e.g.*, interscholastic sports) will not be substituted for meeting the physical education requirement. Students will

spend at least 50 percent of physical education class time participating in moderate to vigorous physical activity.

**Daily Recess.** All elementary school students will have at least 20 minutes a day of supervised recess, preferably outdoors, during which schools should encourage moderate to vigorous physical activity verbally and through the provision of space and equipment.

**Physical Activity Opportunities Before and After School.** All high schools, and middle schools as appropriate, will offer interscholastic sports programs. Bolivar-Richburg Central School will offer a range of activities that meet the needs, interests, and abilities of all students, including boys, girls, students with disabilities, and students with special health-care needs.

**Use of School Facilities Outside of School Hours.** School spaces and facilities should be available upon request to students, staff, and community members before, during, and after the school day, on weekends, and during school vacations. These spaces and facilities also should be available to community agencies and organizations offering physical activity and nutrition programs. School policies concerning safety will apply at all times.

## V. School Nutritional Services During Global Health Crisis

During times of global health crisis school closures, the nutrition department will to every extent possible continue to follow all guidelines set forth in these wellness policies. Adjustments that need to be made will be with District guidance and approval and conveyed to parents and students with as much notice as possible.

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
