SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. Faculty and staff were surveyed online and in-person during departmental meetings. The public was invited to make comments at the school board meeting. Results were tabulated to determine priorities and plans were developed to address district needs. The district will continue to solicit input from stakeholders via school board meetings and surveys twice per year and will incorporate feedback as needed.

The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District will use ARP-ESSER funds to implement COVID prevention and mitigation strategies consistent with current NYSDOH and CDC guidelines. The district will upgrade the HVAC systems at the Elementary School and the Middle/High School. The new HVAC system will improve ventilation, increase air filtration, and enhance energy efficiency.

4. In the space provided below, please describe the data that the LEA will use to identify student needs and monitor student progress as a result of planned interventions and supports.

The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District utilizes a variety of tools to identify student needs and monitor student progress. The following data will be used to identify and develop appropriate interventions and supports:

- i-Ready Diagnostic Assessment (3x/year)
- NWEA Assessment (3x/year)
- NYS 3-8 ELA assessment (annually)
- NYS 3-8 Math assessment (annually)
- NYS 4 & 8 Science assessment (annually)
- · NYS Regents exams (annually)
- Quarterly report cards (4x/year)

Interventions will be documented. Both the identified need and intervention will be clearly communicated with the parent/guardian. Progress monitoring with key staff, including the Classroom Teacher, Building Principal, Interventionists, STEM Coordinator, and School Counselor, will occur regularly to document individual student progress. This monitoring will include an analysis of performance, growth, mental health, and other relevant data regarding the wellness of the whole student. The Director of Curriculum will oversee the collection and analysis of student performance and growth data. She will generate summary reports for presentation to stakeholder groups that are evaluating student progress and making decisions on adjustments to student goals and objectives. State and local assessments will be used to assess the effectiveness of the project-based learning activities implemented by the STEM Coordinator.

5. The district will utilize the ARP-ESSER 20% reserve to fund the salary and benefits for an Elementary STEAM Teacher/Coordinator. This teacher will

- · Provide additional support to students who are struggling with foundational math and literacy skills due to COVID learning loss.
- Develop and promote evidence-based, interdisciplinary STEAM instructional activities through authentic, problem-based curriculum experiences that address COVID learning loss.
- Provide professional learning and support in STEAM instructional strategies that meet the needs of each student through the use of formative assessments and strategically differentiated instruction.

The Bolivar-Richburg CSD will use its remaining ARP-ESSER funding to upgrade the HVAC system in both school buildings, support the salary and benefits of a school nurse to implement risk-reduction and public health protocols, and support a purchased services contract to develop a long-term financial plan.

Improve Air Quality – The district will upgrade the HVAC system in both school buildings. The upgrades will improve air quality and increase the energy efficiency of the systems.

Risk Reduction Protocols – Bolivar CSD will support the salary and benefits of a school nurse who will assess student health, monitor NYSDOH and CDC guidance, and implement new public health strategies and protocols as necessary.

Other – The district will utilize ARP funds to support a purchased services contract with RG Timbs, Inc. to create a long-term financial plan for the district. This plan will provide the district with information regarding spending and assist in recovery from the pandemic.

7. The Bolivar-Richburg CSD has created a system that will ensure that the interventions it implements for each student will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the pandemic. Given the wide range of student needs in the district (students with disabilities, students in foster care, incarcerated youth, English language learners, homeless youth, economically disadvantaged students), monthly progress monitoring meetings with key individuals will be crucial. These stakeholders, including the classroom teacher, building principal, Intervention Specialist, School Social Worker, and School Psychologist will analyze student performance, growth, mental health, and other data regarding the wellness of the whole student to ensure that interventions are responding to the student's needs. Changes will be made as needed to ensure that the student is receiving appropriate interventions. Ongoing dialogue regarding student needs and interventions will take place with parents/guardians.

The STEAM Coordinator will implement project-based learning activities that will help build teamwork, communication, and problem-solving skills nessary to successful social-emotional learning in <u>all</u> students including - students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students
